How John D. Rockefeller Got His Start to Wealth

"When I was 10 year old I had succeeded in earning some money. It was \$50. I loaned it to a neighbor at 7 per cent interest. In a year the money earned me \$3.50. From that time onward I determined to make money work for me."

So writes John D. Rockefeller, who began to make a living at most as soon as he could work. At 10, he was earning \$71 cents a day being a neighbor's potato fields. In 1853, when he was fourteen, he left his home county,

N. Y., birthplace for Cleveland. There he got a job as office boy. Later he became a clerk; then cashier and bookkeeper for a mercantile house. He and two friends managed to borrow enough money to take hold of a petroleum refinery. Rockefeller saw wonderful possibilities in oil and he reached out for one refinery after another, until in 1865 he was able to organize the Standard Oil Company. Six years later the Standard Oil Trust was formed, and Rockefeller was on the way to a fabulous fortune. He had a genius for borrowings. In-

deed, his start was made on borrowed capital plus genius. He is said to have been worth less than \$1,000 in his own right when he was 30. But the borrowed money worked for him until there was no further need to borrow.

Dancing, Old and New.

Like all other things human, dancing is capable of use and abuse. It can be made to produce either good or evil results.

Dancing is as old as the race. It has been employed for three distinct purposes. First, it has been employed as a physical expression of zeal or fervor. Second, it has been employed for personal pleasure. Third, it has been employed to portray certain activities of the body.

The gyrations of North American Indians were without rhythm or sequence. They were calculated to create a wild passion in the mind through violent muscular movement. So were the dances of African savages and desert tribes. In themselves they neither afforded personal

any particular function.

The waltz and minuet of our fathers were arranged for esthetic pleasure. They were rhythmic and idealistic. They followed the ebb and flow of soft, sweet music and could not help inducing healthful emotion and a love and enjoyment of the beautiful.

The notorious eastern dances which grew up with Mohammedanism and the harem were designed for immoral purposes.

There is little to be feared from the Indian death dance or the staid waltz, but from the eastern dance, with its all too obvious symbolism of immorality, there is everything to fear.

These eastern dances first made their appearance in this country through dives and other resorts of ill repute. They worked in the same environment and toward the same end as in their native lands.

They were first brought to public attention by the vaudeville stage. They created a sensation at once and were dignified by the name of art. They were wild, fantastic, and, above all else, new. From vaudeville they were introduced into restaurants and dance halls, and later have been taken up by respectable society.

The American public thinks it has discovered a modern creation in the tango and the turkey trot. The American public is deceived—very much deceived.

In dancing the tango, the turkey trot and other kindred "rags" the American public is only making itself a proselyte to the moral perversion which has characterized Islam and certain other oriental sects.

There is no contending that these dances are immoral. They are immoral in conception, immoral in design, immoral in movement, immoral in purpose.
