D., Editor Medical Standard, discussing the "Cross Method" says: "First it furnishes an 'exact' method of measuring refraction as it actually is without allowance of the ciliary muscle and second it utilizes the well known principle of kinetic synergism by which an active muscle will accept needed relief. Eventually every optician will have to understand and practice this method. Eventually so will every medical man who hopes to maintain his standing as a refractionist."

The governor that signed the Optometry Law in California endorsing the optician's method was an oculist.
