EAGLE LAKE GROWN FIGS CANNED AT LOCAL PLANT

The Eagle Lake Fruit and Canning Company this week received a carload of five gallon cans and began canning figs at the company's plant just completed adjoining the Eagle Lake Manufacturing Company. The plant is owned by Messrs. Kolberg & Anderson, who have something like seventy acres in bearing fig trees and eighty acres of young trees, a part of which will be bearing next year. These figs are being canned, not preserved, like they were last year. The five gallon cans are filled with fruit and then boiled in steam vats and sealed. They are in that form shipped to wholesalers who re-work them and when they reach the trade they are fig preserves. A large wholesale firm in Chicago has contracted with the company for its entire crop of figs. The plant is located on the east side of the plant, where is employed at the plant, stated that next season they will likely can cabbage, tomatoes, asparagus and many other kinds of vegetables.

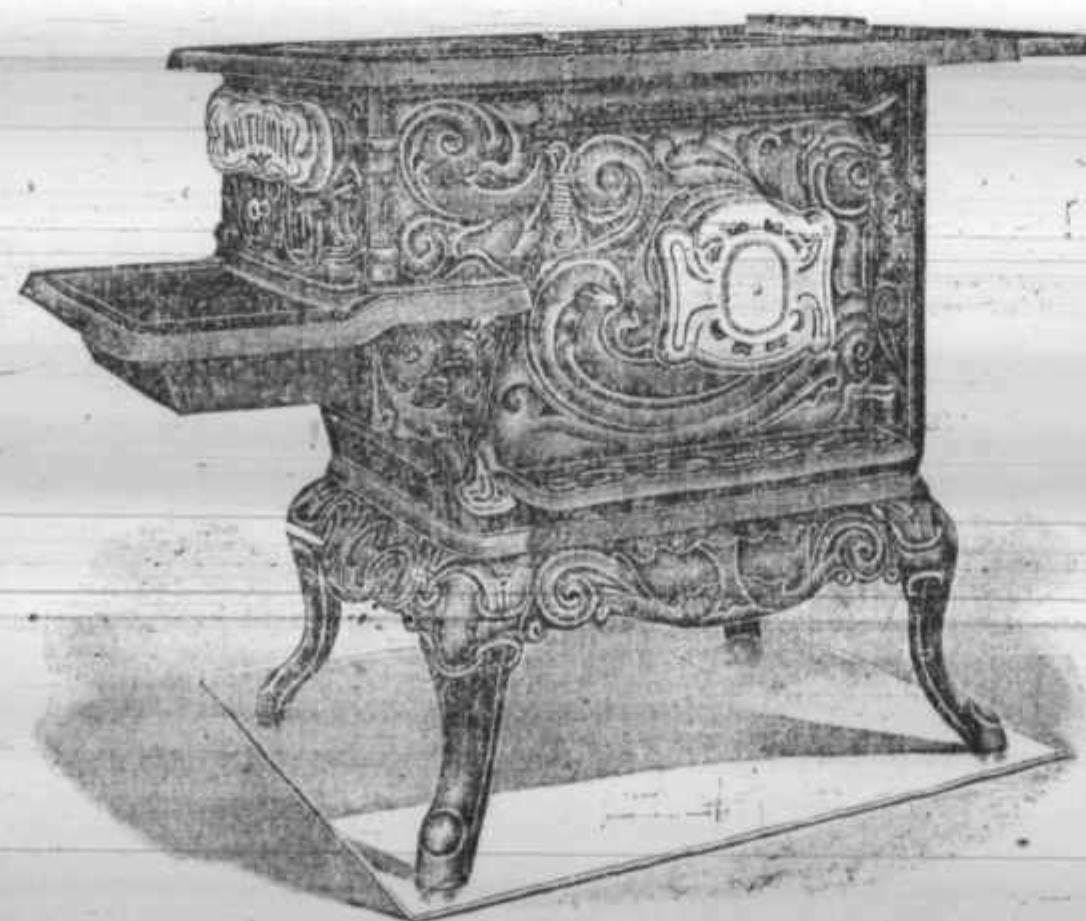

RAIN RUINS THOUSAND BALES AROUND WEIMAR

Weimar, Tex., Sept. 15—Continued rains have nearly ruined the cotton crop of this section. The leaf worms were bad in some places, with no hindrance, have completely stripped the fields—in some instances attacking even the small bolls. The rain is estimated, beat out and destroyed at least 1,000 bales of cotton in this section. All cotton blown on the ground has sprouted and is therefore ruined. The rains were fine for pasturage and stock water.
