

SCHOOL ELECTION WILL BE HELD JUDGE DISSOLVES INJUNCTIONS.

On a hearing of the Eagle Lake Independent School District case in Columbus last night, Judge M. Kennon entered an order that "Defendants general demurrer is sustained, and the injunction dissolved for want of equity in the bill." The plaintiffs, those causing the injunction, through Martin et al gave a \$1000 injunction bond on the issuing of this injunction, which was dissolved by the court last night. This is the case wherein Frank Martin, L. J. Edwards, Walter Adams, W. S. Campbell, August Johnson, A. E. Deats, Ohas Banning, W. W. McCormick, V. A. Hayden, T. W. Martin, Oliver Martin and M. B. Briggs filed a

petition for injunction on the 25th day August for injunction restraining the school board from holding an election in this school district to determine whether or not a tax shall be levied and collected in said district for the maintenance of the Eagle Lake school. The second injunction by the same parties, A. E. Deats and L. J. Edwards having withdrawn their names, was issued. The hearing last night in the matter in which the school board won out, was a joint

hearing of the two cases, in which the Judge dissolved both injunctions. The Judge's decision in the matter gives the school board the right to hold the election, which will be done, and there is not a doubt but that the election will carry by an overwhelming majority. The plaintiffs were represented by W. L. Adkins of Columbus, the defendants, the school board, by Judge Woods of Seguin, Judge Mansfield of Columbus and A. J. Wirtz of Eagle Lake.

Beginning on the Farm.

Young men who have small capital should feel honored to be employed by honest, reliable and successful men, who have capital and character. This gives young men a chance to earn a living and save their earnings until business of whatever kind they choose can be started for themselves.

Usually the best plan for a farmer boy who must begin for himself without capital and with little education is to hire to a successful farmer until he saves capital enough to begin farming as a tenant. Many successful farmers have begun this way; it is the way business men begin, but farming differs from most other businesses in that it takes less capital to own business than in ordinary commercial occupations. Comparatively few clerks, salesmen, bookkeepers, etc., become owners of a great business compared to the number of hired men and women who become farmers. This shows the opportunities in farming.

Remember that you must make your employer a profit on your labor. It is not sufficient that you earn your wages. There would be no good reason for hiring men that barely pay their wages. The employer must make a profit on your labor. A good plan is to strive to earn twice as much as you are paid.

Salaries and wages are not increased because the employer thinks the wages or salary will be earned, but because it has been earned. This holds true on the farm, in other work or in business. You must earn your increase in pay before you get it. The fact that people expect increase in pay before they earn it has caused disappointment and often resulted in hands being discharged.
