

CHARLES E. WOODWARD, CHURCH WORKER, DEAD

From the San Antonio Light.
Charles E. Woodward, forty-two years of age, brother of D. J. Woodward of this city, died at 8:30 o'clock this (Wednesday) morning at the Santa Rosa hospital, following an operation for appendicitis. Mr. Woodward was a native of San Antonio, but had spent the last few years of his life in Eagle Lake, Texas, where he was engaged in Christian missionary work. He came to San Antonio last Friday for treatment.

While in San Antonio Mr. Woodward was connected with his brother here in the carriage and automobile business, but he soon gave up the commercial life and left for Eagle Lake, his future field of Christian endeavor. He was well known and universally loved there, and when leaving for San Antonio for medical treatment a very large crowd gathered at the station to see him off. Mr. Woodward was of the Baptist denomination, but his teaching was unsectarian, his life being devoted to helping the needy and afflicted, performing good deeds and spreading the Christian doctrine.

Surviving are his mother, Mrs. Addie Woodward of Eagle Lake, two brothers, D. J. Woodward of San Antonio and S. H. Woodward of Miami, Ariz., and three sisters, Mrs. J. C. Jacobs of Waller, Tex.; Mrs. M. B. Anderson of Lexington, Ky., and Mrs. G. W. Hagy of San Antonio. The funeral will be held at 4:30 o'clock tomorrow (Thursday) afternoon from the First Baptist church, the Rev. S. J. Porter to officiate. Burial will be made in City Cemetery No. 1.

With the exceptions of Mr. and Mrs. Morgan, Miss Jennings of Martindale is the only teacher this year who was a member of last year's teaching force.

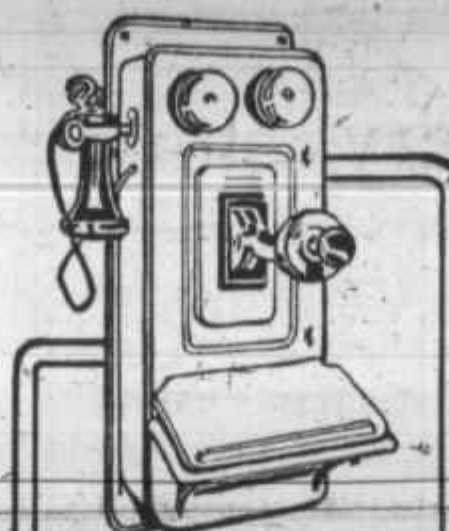
Mr. J. C. White of White's Ranch, cashier of the State Bank at Stowell, was here this week, the guest of Mr. A. M. McDow.

LAKESIDE SUGAR MILL PROPERTY IS SOLD

The property of the Lakeside Sugar Refining Company was sold at receiver's sale by Receiver C. R. Barbe at the court house in Columbus yesterday, the sale beginning at 11 o'clock in the morning. Mr. Jacob Moershal of St. Louis, through his agent or attorney, was the purchaser, buying in 8200 acres of the Bonus plantation for \$275,000.00, about \$33.00 per acre; 1200 acres for something over \$42,000.00. The sugar mill and fifty-three acres of land sold for \$71,000.00. The accounts, amounting to \$25,000.00, unpaid moneys on stock subscriptions, sold for \$1010.00. The total amount of the sale is \$391,000.00. The sale passed, according to the receiver's statement, with all incumbrances, amounting to \$400,000.00. The sale is made subject to the approval of the court. All sales of lands were made without the crops now growing on them, possession of the lands to be given on the first of the year. The sugar mill was sold without any of the supplies now on hand. About 4000 acres of the 8200 acres of land on the Bonus plantation, according to Receiver Barbe, are in a body of open tillable land. All bids were required to be accompanied by a certified check for 5 percent of the total amount.
