GOVERNMENT REPORT SHOWS COTTON SHORT

The government report issued
by the Department of Commerce
shows that Colorado county is
442 bales of cotton, on Septem-
ber first, behind last year's re-
cord. The record shows the
county was short of cotton 442
bales in Colorado county prior to
September 1st, 1912, to be 10,290
and this year up to the same time
9,848.

just reached the top. The river

plant, nearly seven inches from
six to nine o'clock this morning.

is here today, he being a passen-
ger en route to San Antonio, pre-

rather than lay over at Harwood
with the water bound trains.
