ROSH HASHANAH 5674 USHERED IN WEDNESDAY

Commencing last Wednesday evening at sunset and lasting twenty-four hours, the Jewish New Year—Rosh Hashanah 5674—was celebrated.

With this festival, marking the beginning of the civil year traditionally observed at the period of the autumnal equinox, the cycle of celebrations of the month of Tishri begins—New Year Day, Day of Atonement and Feast of Tabernacles. The first two are allied, their observance implying moral retrospection. The last is one of the three thanksgiving or pilgrim festivals subsequent to the ingathering of the seasonable harvest, Passover and Pentecost being the other two.

While the month of Nisan (March-April) was Biblically designated the head of the months because of the all-important ex-

istence of the civil year, in Hebrew Rosh Hashanah was traditionally observed on the first day of the seventh Jewish month, as the anniversary of the creation of the world. It is to be noted that although this festival was solemnly enjoined as a "day of alarm" and a period of special worship in Biblical times, its character as the anniversary of the world's birthday is probably of post-Biblical origin. However that may be and there is certainly nothing lost in the added emphasis placed by the early Rabbis upon the annual occurrence after the destruction of the temple of Jerusalem and the consequent dispersion of Israel, "the day of sounding the alarm" was invested with a sanctity second only to Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, with which it has much in common. It is and always has been, wherever located, as a day where in customary vocations must cease, and in divine worship and serious meditation followers of the faith must attempt to review past actions as well as the motives of these actions, discarding the unworthy and resolving upon a better standard of conduct.

The Scriptural appellation for the New Year, Yom Hazikoron, Day of Memorial or Day of Remembrance, and the post-Scriptural designation, Yom Hadin, Day of Judgment, seem to point to the raison d'être of the festival as mentioned above; a diligent retrospection of our actions and an unbiased mental judgment thereon, hence the synagogue ritual of Rosh Hashanah, emphasizing man's frailty and God's righteousness, calls each individual before the bar of his own conscience and bids him live in accordance with everything that is just and right. In very truth both the New Year and Day of Atonement are, for their adherents, days of judgment. Of Biblical origin, they have been observed with due solemnity according to the divine command even unto this day.

Dr. J. W. Bedell, aged 79 years, died at the home of Mr. J. D. Morse near Matthews Tuesday afternoon. Dr. Bedell was formerly from Platonis, having moved to Chesterville where he lived two years, moving from there to Matthews where for the past two years he has made his home with Mr. Morse's family.

The doctor was not related to Mr. Morse, though his wife had practically raised him, and Mr. Morse was very near to him. The funeral was held Wednesday afternoon with interment in the Lakeside cemetery, Rev. J. A. Stephen, the Baptist minister, conducting the services. 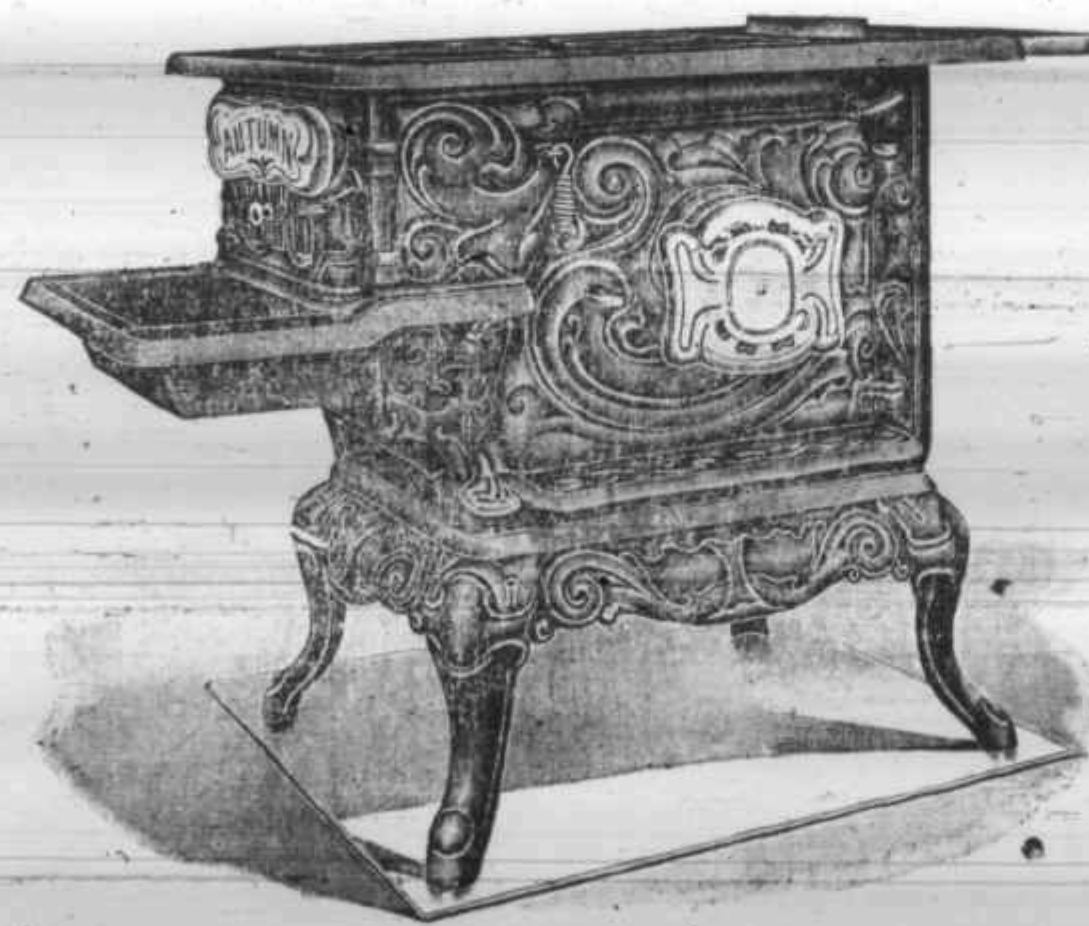

Columbus, Texas, Sept. 30. At last a market for long staple cotton has been established in Houston and raisers of this fibre need no longer ship their product to New Orleans for disposition.

J. R. Wooten of this place has just sold through Captain William Christian 10 bales of his cotton for 16 cents per pound and two bales for 15 cents, which is equal to the best prices paid in New Orleans this season for this class of staple. The difference in the freight rates between the two markets equal a 12-cent price in New Orleans.

CHARLEY HOLLIN

SHOOTS FATHER-IN-LAW.

Corpus Christi, Texas, Oct. 6. Charley Hollin, a young white man, is in the County Jail and H. M. Bacon, a prominent farmer residing 17 miles west of this city, is in a local sanitarium with wounds that attending physicians state will make chances of his recovery very remote, as the result of a shooting which occurred at the farm Sunday night shortly after the wedding of the bride.

Hollin and Miss Lillian Bacon were married in Corpus Christi on September 24, over parental objections from parents of the bride. Last Saturday the couple went to the Bacon farm in effort to effect a reconciliation.

Hollin, in the jail cell this afternoon, said to The Post's representative:

"Mr. Bacon had tried to get his daughter, my wife, to leave me. Mr. Bacon then said that he would kill both me and my wife. 'I will paint the Osceola bridge with your blood,' he told me.

"I knew that my life and the life of my wife was in danger and I shot Mr. Bacon.

"Leola and I had been married since September 24, and we were happy but her father tried to get her to quit me and to make me leave the country. Why he hated me I do not know. He warned me that if I did not leave Leola that he would kill both of us and he also killed her.

"I used a shotgun and a revolver. I do not know whether or not he is dead, but I hope he is not."

A shotgun and a revolver were used in the shooting. Birdshot from the first named, literally tore away the scalp of Bacon, exposing his brain. A bullet from the revolver tore through Bacon's left hand.

Hollin went to Robstown and surrendered to Deputy Sheriff Hope and was brought to Corpus Christi this morning.—Houston Post.

Mr. Hollin is formerly from Colorado county, a son of Mr. John Hollin, living about ten miles north of Eagle Lake. The young man with his bride was here last week spending several days with his father's family north of town.

Mr. Bacon died during the night from the effects of the wounds.
