In the case of the State of Texas vs. Jesse Thomas, charged with aggravated assault, the defendant pleaded guilty and was fined \$25.00 and costs.

In the case of the State of Texas vs. Max Schindler, charged with unlawfully carrying a pistol in his saddle bags, trial by jury, verdict not guilty under charge of the court.

In the case of the State of Texas vs. C. D. Creviston, charged with unlawfully conducting a pharmacy, motion to quash complaint sustained and cause dismissed.

In the case of the State of Texas vs. E. E. Clement, charged with unlawfully practicing medicine, dismissed by county attorney.

The State of Texas vs. Chas. G. Baumberg, charged with an affray, upon motion of the defendant's attorneys, the complaint was quashed and the cause dismissed.

Attorney W. S. Strickland who is encouraging the growing of sugar beets in this section, recently sent a number of the beets grown here on prairie land to the government department in Washington for a test. These beets tested 68 percent purity and 9 percent clear sugar, which is said to be an excellent test. This week Mr. Strickland sent a sack of bottom grown beets to Garden City, Kansas, and a sack to Denver, Colorado, for tests. Mr. Strickland is very much enthused over the proposition of growing sugar beets here, believing, if sufficient acreage is planted here, the local sugar mill will change to a combination mill, adding new machinery which will enable

beets. It will be a fine thing for our section if such conditions can be brought about.
