WATER POWER IS WASTED

of \$325,000 the above idea can be consummated. It costs \$70 per horsepower per year to develop from steam in Houston. To secure the sale of this power in Houston, and to be conservative, support it would be sold at \$60 per horsepower per year. Allowing a loss of 10 per cent to convey the power to Houston, 3987 horsepower at \$60 per year would bring annually \$239,220 and find a waiting demand. That yearly income is pretty close to the permanent investment.

A newspaper item in The Houston Post a year or two ago recited that the town of El Campo would pay more in one season for gasoline alone to pump water on rice crops three months than it would cost to develop this power. The town of El Campo is 40 miles

Considering this possible power for factories the saving over steam is enormous. Two hundred horsepower is as much as a large flour mill or cotton factory would be likely to require. To generate 2000 horsepower from steam from wood would require no less than 70,000 cords of wood per annum, which at the low estimate of \$2.50 per cord amounts to \$175,000, to say nothing of the first cost difference between steam and hydraulic machinery and the severe wear and tear of the steam plants compared to the simple turbine wheel, while the cost of maintaining a like amount of power from the fall of the water in this river ought not exceed \$12,000 per annum, including wear and tear, salaries and taxes.

Flourmills are paying investments when run by steam, whether located in the wheat belt or on the water. There is a freight arrangement known as "milling in transit" that makes it as feasible to locate a flour mill at a point like Columbus as at the wheat fields or the sea-coast, provided the flour is intended for local consumption or export.

Southern manufactured products of all kinds intended for export to the Orient and all Southern countries will enjoy an advantage after the opening of the Panama Canal.

An idea that would require a vast amount of money to consummate but which would pay the greatest returns is to build an electric railroad from one of the sea coast towns north through Columbus to Brenham. Such a line 125 miles long would cross or touch seven trunk lines that run east and west and would largely increase in value a great scope of fertile country. The idea conceives securing options or buying outright land along such a line before the location or intention would be announced and selling the land after the road would be in operation. In accord with this plan traffic would be carried over the road during the day only and the power sold for night use to electrical light the towns along the route and to pump water to irrigate rice or other crops.

A. E. ANDERSON FOUND DEAD NEAR MATTHEWS.

A. E. Anderson, sixty-three years of age, was found dead Saturday morning, near Matthews. The body was found to the side of the road, with hat under head, as if used for a pillow. Mr. Anderson, with Dr. G. S. Love, moved here four years ago, and since that time the two old men have lived together in a little house on the Ramsey road, about two and a half miles west of

Matthews. Mr. Anderson had not been in the best of health for some time past, Dr. Love states that he was not in poor health. He left the house Tuesday morning to come to town for some groceries, and was not seen by Dr. Love any more until after the discovery of his dead body. Dr. Love states that he believes the old man thought he was coming back out home, which is just to one side of the Southern Pacific railroad, but instead of walking out the Southern Pacific track, took the Santa Fe and walked until in the vicinity of Matthews. Then he is thought to have left the railroad and strolled around in an effort to locate himself, when the chilly night overtook him, and he lay down to sleep. During the night it is believed he got so cold that he was never able to revive, and died where he was found. The body was buried in the Lakeside cemetery Sunday.

IN COLORADO COUNTY FOR FIFTY-NINE YEARS

FARMERS ADVANCED WITH FALL PLOWING.

Another heavy rain on Tuesday evening and night, has again delayed the fall plowing. The farmers everywhere in this community have been rushing their plowing since the ground has dried off sufficiently since the last heavy rain. We are told by one of the farmers of this section, that the farmers, generally speaking, have more land already plowed now than was ever before known to be plowed at this season of the year.

HEAVY HAIL STORM IN NEDRA VICINITY.

Mr. John Helmer of Nedra was in the city on business from his potato plantation Wednesday and reports a hard hail storm in that vicinity Tuesday night. He says the hail storm, lasted for more than an hour, large hail stones falling at a terrific rate all the while. Mr. Helmer says there was a great deal of wind with the hail, which also did much damage through that section.

Helmer's seed house at Nedra was blown across the Santa Fe track, the front of the gallery of the Bonus store blown off, quite a number of trees around both Nedra and Bonus blown down, outhouses upset and fences blown down. Mr. Helmer stated that the house that he lived in was one of the best in that section, and that before the hail storm was over things were just about as wet inside of the house as outside, the hail having damaged the roof of the building and broken out almost every window glass. Mr. Helmer says he did not go to his potato field on account of the muddy, soggy condition of the roads before coming to town, but that he passed some potato fields that the hail had whipped and beaten down so that you could not see even where the rows were, the potato vines having been whipped off smooth with the ground. He says the fall gardens at Nedra, which were now just ready for usage, are simply ruined. There is not enough left in some of them, he said, to tell that they had ever been gardens.
