ROCK ISLAND VISITED BY SEVERE HAIL STORM

The most destructive hail storm in the history of Rock Island fell at that place Tuesday evening between the hours of five and eight. The first storm came from the northwest and in about an hour the wind changed to the northeast. Every residence and business house at that place, where the windows were not screened securely, lost all window glasses on the north and east. A horse hitched to a buggy and tied in front of Priestmeyer & Weimar's store, kicked loose from the buggy, ran upon the sidewalk and almost entirely demolished the large plate glass windows in front of the store. The damage done to the new school building will reach \$300, and school was closed for the remainder of the week. Trees are almost destitute of foliage since the storm. So much damage has been done to the grass by the hail that stockmen are entertaining fears as to winter pasturage. A searching party was out all night during the storm, searching for strayed animals. Mrs. John Plesher, who had gone to Columbus in a buggy Tuesday morning. A report was brought to town that they were seen in Fig City during the storm with their horse unmanageable. Quite a number of Rock Island citizens, mostly cow men, left early Wednesday morning to join the search. The two ladies, however, reached that place safe and sound from Columbus Wednesday afternoon.

VOLUNTEER SPUD CROP MAKES \$60.00 PER ACRE

Mr. W. J. Magee, one of the best potato growers in this section of the country, brought in a wagon load of new fall potatoes last Wednesday and sold them to the local merchants. These potatoes were dug from volunteer vines, the fields that had been planted in potatoes in the spring, then planted in peas. Mr. Magee dug twelve bushels from a quarter of an acre. At this rate, the volunteer crop will average him forty-eight bushels to the acre, and at the prevailing price, \$1.25 per bushel, will net him \$60.00 per acre. Not a bad crop at all, this volunteer crop. Especially when there was absolutely no work given it and really Mr. Magee did not realize it was there. He says he is going to put a force of men in all his pea fields and dig out the volunteer crop, for the potatoes are too large and too fine to leave to leave in the field. Mr. Magee says with a couple of weeks more good weather now his fall crop of spuds will average a hundred bushels to the acre.

WILD DUCKS INJURING RICE IN THE FIELDS

Wild ducks are said to be doing considerable damage in some of the rice fields of this section. Some of the fields, after they have been visited by droves of countless numbers of ducks, look as if they might have had a visit from a bunch of hogs. The ducks are destroying a great deal of rice.

GARWOOD GETS SIX INCH RAIN FALL

Mr. Ed. R. Frnka is in town on business from his home at Garwood Wednesday and reports a terrific rain in the Garwood section on Tuesday evening and night amounting to fully 5 1/2 or 6 inches. He says everything in that country is a sea of water and that some of the rice shocks in the low places were almost covered with water. The Mustang Creek, above Garwood, he says was a mile wide, the highest it has been since 1900. Mr. Frnka says he noticed that the heavy hail that accompanied the rain had almost stripped some of the cane in the fields between here and Garwood and that practically all the cane had been broken by the wind. Owing to the advanced stage of that crop, which is now ready for cutting, the cane will not be damaged to any great extent, though on account of its leaning and twisted condition, will be harder to cut. Mr. Frnka says the rain there was much heavier than the big rain two weeks ago.
