J. O. WALKER BURIED IN COLUMBUS WEDNESDAY

Mr. J. O. Walker, age sixty-three, died at his home in this city at 7:45 o'clock last Tuesday morning. The body was shipped to Columbus, Mo. on the ten-thirty train Wednesday morning, interment taking place in that city same afternoon. Mr. Walker, with his family, moved to Eagle Lake from Columbus a little over two years ago. He was a good man and every one liked him, and his death is mourned by a large circle of friends. He was one of the old residents of Colorado county, having resided in the county for more than fifty-five years. Mr. Walker has been in ill health for a number of years and his death was not unexpected. He leaves a wife and eight children, five sons and three daughters, Messrs. Ashley, Henry, Richard, James and Phillip, Mrs. Maude Williams, Mrs. James Phillips and Mrs. Carrie Machlin, all of whom live in Eagle Lake, except Richard who lives in Yoakum and Mrs. Machlin who lives in El Campo. All of his children were at the bedside when the end came. To the bereaved relatives the Headlight extends its sincerest sympathy in their sad hour of sorrow.

601 BARRELS OF RICE ON TWENTY ACRES

One of the best yields of rice made in this section this season, or any other season, was threshed out last week on the Frank Stephens Company's place, a short distance from town, farmed by Messrs. Gus and Ernest Seaholm. On twenty acres of land they threshed out six hundred and one barrels of rice, which is a little better than thirty barrels per acre. This, however, is an exceptional yield of rice, and was planted from imported seed.

BIG PICNIC ON THE BERNARD SUNDAY

Mr. A. E. Hearst was in town from his place on the Bernard Tuesday. He says the neighbors of his section were preparing to have a big barbecue and picnic in his pasture on the Bernard next Sunday. Last spring a large number of the people of that section had a wolf hunt through that community and succeeded in killing quite a number of wolves, on which a bounty for each scalp is paid by the state. This money was put into a fund, which will defray the expenses of the barbecue and picnic next Sunday.

Mr. Moseley accompanied her as far as Seely. Mr. Moseley received a message Sunday from his wife that her father died about mid-night Saturday. The funeral was held in Temple Sunday afternoon.

FIRST WEDDING IN THE NEW CATHOLIC CHURCH

Keyser, of near Mento, and Miss Annie Class, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Class of near Eagle Lake, were married in this city at the Catholic church at ten o'clock Tuesday morning. Rev. Father Montraul officiating. This is the first wedding to take place in the new Catholic church, the handsome new building prettily decorated in cut flowers for the occasion. Mr. and Mrs. Keyser will make their home near Mento where the groom is engaged in farming. The couple marched in to the strains of Mendelssohn's wedding march rendered by Miss Marie Paul Barbe, they being met at the altar by the priest. After the ceremony the wedding party drove out to the home of the bride's parents where an elegant wedding dinner was served. Mr. and Mrs. Causey were at her bedside when the end came. The remains were shipped to Eagle Lake on the early Wednesday morning train. The funeral services were held at four o'clock Wednesday afternoon at the Causey home, interment being made in the Masonic cemetery, Rev. J. A. Stephen, the Baptist pastor, conducting the services, both at the home and at the grave.

For some time past Mrs. Boyd has been at a sanitarium in San Antonio where everything possible was done for her comfort in her illness. She was born in Nicholasville, Kentucky, on December 24th, 1834 moving to Texas in the early days, and spent most of her life in Colorado county, living at Columbus for a number of years, then moving to Eagle Lake where she has made her home with her daughter for many, many years.
