AWARD PRIZES FOR PECANS

Colorado County Lands Prizes at National Nut Growers' Association in Houston.

The prize awards for the best pecan nuts grown on native trees in Colorado county have been announced. Mr. J. G. Reitz of Garwood received first premium, H. J. C. Koehn of Weimar captured second prize and C. H. Allison of Eagle Lake the third prize. This contest was inaugurated by Messrs. Kolberg & Anderson of the Eagle Lake Nurseries for the purpose of securing a good display of native pecans grown in this county to be shown at the National Nut Growers' convention in Houston. The awards made at the convention have not yet been published. Because of the short time given in which to enter the exhibits, many who have fine pecan trees bearing excellent varieties of nuts were not able to make entries in the time allowed. The prizes secured by the above winners are ten dollars, five dollars and three dollars for first, second and third prizes respectively, the amounts being payable in nursery stock from the Eagle Lake Nurseries. The proprietors of this nursery announced that they will offer another prize contest next year and at that time will be able to give notice of contest some time in advance and expect to make some substantial prize offers for that occasion. "Forward lookers" among the pecan growers in the county will note this down and take exceptionally good care of their more valuable pecan trees, so as to produce some exceptionally fine nuts for exhibits as well as market.

Regarding market for pecans, the National Nut Growers' Association has taken up the question of breaking up the commission men's combine which has depressed prices to growers while they themselves put the nuts on the market at prices ranging from 18c to \$1.00, according to size and quality of nut. That the improved pecan is a money maker can be seen by the fact that entire plantations in Louisiana are being planted to the budded varieties which are known to be prolific bearers of the finest quality. Texas has heretofore marketed only the native nuts in ungraded mixed lots and this method of marketing has also assisted in depression of prices to growers, although many growers of budded stock have long time contracts for all they can produce at prices ranging from 25c to \$1.00 the pound. With better attention given to the better native trees and the budding of the poorer nut trees, the pecan will be a source of profit on every farm where the better sorts are grown.

HOOKEWORM EXPERTS HERE

Dr. H. Ferrell and Assistant, Under State Board of Health, to Treat All Cases Free.

The State Board of Health and Colorado County are just beginning a campaign against hook worm disease in this county, under the direction of Dr. Herbert Ferrell and his assistant, Mr. Eugene Moore, who are now in Eagle Lake. The examination and treatment will be free of charge, and it is hoped that every one will take advantage of this opportunity, especially the school children. With the co-operation of all the physicians, school teachers and other citizens the State Board of Health hopes to determine the situation of this disease and stamp it out. The work has been completed in twenty-eight counties, where approximately 45,000 have been examined, with about 33 per cent of this number infected with the hook worms. This means that 15,000 of these were below par and not up to the standard health limit.

The most constant symptoms, according to Dr. Ferrell, are pale-ness, indigestion, shortness of breath, lack of energy, etc. Pale-ness, he says, is the most constant, because these worms sap the vitality, suck the blood through the intestines.

Beginning at Eagle Lake Saturday, November 22nd, Dr. Ferrell and his assistant will visit the following places every week for six weeks:

Eagle Lake on Saturdays, at Norris building; Columbus on Tuesdays at the court house; Weimar on Wednesdays; Garwood on Thursdays and Rock Island on Fridays.

Dr. Ferrell asks that every one cast away false modesty and false pride, and be examined.

When the district was changed it became necessary to re-vote the tax. The election Tuesday will merely be re-voting a tax that we have had for a number of years, not a new tax nor an additional tax. The tax in the new district can never be more than fifty cents on the hundred dollars valuation for any purpose.
