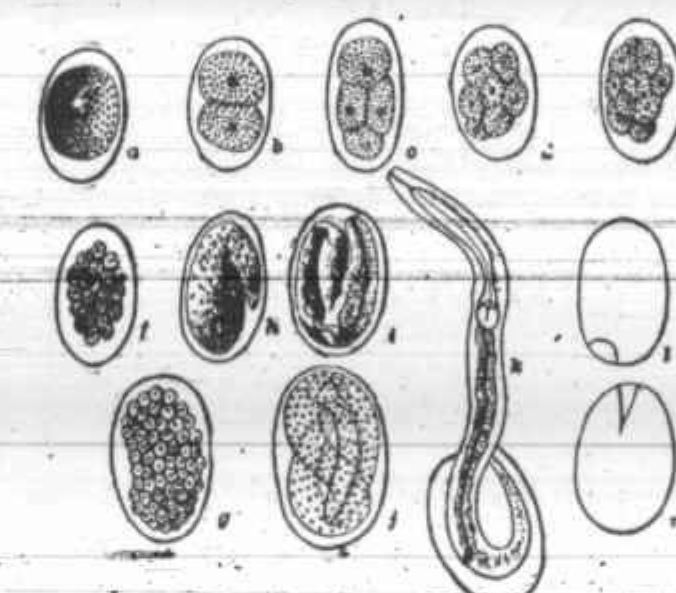

These eggs develop into larvae in the soil. The larvae then enter the body of a person who has walked barefooted on the soil. The larvae then develop into adults in the body of the person. The adults then lay more eggs, and the cycle continues.

It is no disgrace to have this disease, so cast away false modesty and false pride and be examined. Everyone should be examined, especially the children, because in some localities 40 or 50 per cent of them are infected.

The State and County Free Dispensaries Have Been Phenomenal Successes

All those who desire to have examinations made should bring in a very small portion of the bowel movement in a small tin box. This is examined under the microscope for the eggs of the hookworm. At the dispensary the microscope is used for this purpose, specimens of hookworms and other intestinal worms may be seen and free literature may be had on Hookworm Disease and other common diseases. Pamphlets giving plans for the treatment of hookworm disease may also be had at the dispensaries.

Every one should visit the dispensary and see the exhibits and be prepared to have the examination made. Where there is infection it should be recognized as early as possible. If there is no infection, when it is so very prevalent one should be glad of an opportunity to find that he is free of the disease. Come to the dispensary yourself, and bring your family and the children. Those found infected will be treated free. The physician in charge is a specialist in hookworm disease. He will be assisted by a trained nurse.

Evangelist Ham vs. High School Text Book.

There was a bomb exploded in the camp at Elgin on a recent Sunday night when Evangelist Ham, who had been conducting a union meeting in that city, came on the platform about 8 o'clock and spoke to Mr. Ramsey, the choirster, who immediately silenced the large choir. And the evangelist opened a

strange looking book which he announced was one of the new text books for Texas schools, Physical Geography, by R. S. Tarr, and read the following lines: "Page 369, paragraph 243. Early Man—The origin of man is not known, although scientists generally agree that he has developed, by the process of evolution, from some high form of animal. This belief is based upon the close resemblance between the

body of man and ape, and receives support from the fact that in habits and mode of living, some savages are little above animals. But even the least civilized men have powers that no animal possesses, while civilized man is so far above the highest animals that some people believe it impossible that he is the descendant of an animal." Then he read from Genesis 2-27, "And God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them." Now you mothers and fathers can understand why your children have so little respect for you and so little faith in God and the Bible. How can a child respect his ancestors when he has been taught that they are descendants of monkeys? How can he believe in God and the Bible when his school has taught him that it is absolutely false, fallacy and fiction?

The statement "Scientists generally agree," I challenge and brand as not only unworthy of a scholar, but a bare faced lie, which will be repudiated by the rank and file of the reputable scientists of the world over.

The evangelist then read the opinions of quite a number of noted scientists to uphold his position. Then he said: "I challenge any professor in any State University to produce one scientific fact in support of the Darwinian theory of the origin of man. I also say that a man who has not enough sense to distinguish between science and philosophy is disqualified as a scholar to be the author of a text book for our schools, and I further say, that a board of education who will pass on such a book and

hand it over to our children is eternally disqualified for their office. They might be skilled enough to pick and grade cotton, but certainly they are unfit to select and grade school books for the schools. And an administration which will appoint such a board need never pose any more as an educative administration for they have made themselves the ridicule of scholars and last, but not least, they have insulted the Christian science of the state to pass such blasphemous rot over to the trustful youths of our state.
