DEATH OF MR. SHEPPERD FATHER OF MRS. MOSELEY

The death of Eliza W. T. Shepperd, aged 64, occurred at the Oriental Hotel on South First street early Sunday morning after an illness of one week's duration. Funeral services were conducted at the home Sunday afternoon by Rev. Carroll Smith pastor of Memorial Baptist church, in the presence of a large concourse of friends and relatives. Interment was made in the City Cemetery following the funeral oration.

Deceased was born in Upshur county, Texas, 64 years ago and had never left the border of the state but once. He was a Texan who loved the Lone Star because it meant home to him. For a time he fought in the civil war under the Confederate flag, being too young to participate in all that great struggle. In 1884 he came to Dallas county and lived near Rogers, where he remained for 20 years ago and purchasing the Oriental Hotel and other property. He was held in the highest esteem by everyone and the sympathies of a host of friends go to the bereaved family.

Besides a widow, deceased leaves six sons and four daughters, having two daughters and one son dead. All the children were at his bedside when he died. They were Monroe T. Shepperd, chief of police of Temple; L. W. E. M. W. W. and C. R. R. of this city; C. D. Shepperd of Gatesville; Mrs. Beulah Moseley of Eagle Lake; Mrs. Etta Peck of Heidelberg; Mrs. Emma Slaughter and Mrs. Cora Faith of this city. A brother, A. A. Shepperd, of Zephyr was also here for the funeral, and one other brother, M. K. Shepperd, of Hamlin is still living.—Temple Times.

GET LARGE BAG OF DUCKS

Eagle Lake Boys Fire into Duck Pond on Big Prairie and Pick Up Eighty Ducks.

Messrs. J. K. Callahan, Bob Robson, Howard Strahan and Duke Eggers, spent last Saturday evening and Sunday morning down on "Big Prairie" duck hunting. The four crawled up on a pond, where a great many ducks had been seen to light, and after they finished shooting, having fired sixteen shots in all,

large ones. Fearing that should they get in another "pot shot" they might exceed the game limit, they returned home, bringing the game with them to show for it—a whole flock load of big, fine ducks. This is the largest "pot shot" of the present hunting season of which we have learned.

LITTLE OPPOSITION TO SCHOOL TAX ELECTION

The election held here last Tuesday to determine whether or not the school tax should be levied and collected in the Eagle Lake Independent School district, passed off very quietly, with but very little opposition shown and only a small vote polled. There were 104 votes cast for the tax and 11 against. Twice before when the election order was issued, the opposition got out an injunction restraining judges from holding the election. The question was finally argued before Judge Kennon in Columbus, with Hon. W. L. Adkins attorney for the opposition, and Judge Woods of Seguin, Judge Mansfield of Columbus and A. J. Wirtz of Eagle Lake representing the school board. The court ruled that there was not sufficient grounds on which to perpetuate the injunction, and that same could be held in accordance with the law. The court costs, however, have amounted to considerable, which interferes to some extent in the carrying on of the school work.

COLUMBUS HUNTERS GET TWO BIG BUCKS

Messrs. T. J. Balhorn, S. J. McClung and H. P. Hahn spent several days the early part of the week on a deer hunt on the Sandmeyer ranch, with a party of Columbus hunters. Mr. H. A.
