

WILL REMAIN NEXT WEEK

On Account of Bad Weather, the Carnival Shows Will Remain Here all Next Week.

Owing to the very inclement weather encountered here by the carnival this week, the J. G. Miller Carnival Company will remain in Eagle Lake during all of next week. They are advertised to begin in Schulenburg next Monday, but have postponed the Schulenburg date one week longer in order to remain in Eagle Lake another week.

The carnival grounds are on the McCarty lots, near the G. W. Keith lumber yards.

The carnival was due to reach here Sunday, but the major portion of the outfit did not arrive until Tuesday morning. The delay is said to be due to the slow moving of the outfit from muddy grounds at their last show town, Brenham. The wild west show, which joined them

smaller side shows which came from Cuero, arrived on time Sunday and have been showing every night since. After arriving late Tuesday, the outfit did not get opened up in time to show that night. Wednesday night just before show time a rain fell, making it so disagreeable that only a small crowd was present at the carnival grounds. It rained nearly all day yesterday, rendering the carnival grounds so sloppy and muddy that not a great many ventured out last night to wade around in the mud and slush to see the carnival shows. As a whole, the carnival is the largest that has ever visited Eagle Lake, but on account of the lateness in arriving and the unfavorable weather the past two nights they have been opened up, they have met with hard luck in the way of a very slim attendance. If the carnival is in the Galveston News from Eagle Lake where large crowds were here attending the carnival and the town was "gayly decorated." If the weather is favorable today and tomorrow and through next week, no doubt there will be a good attendance at the carnival shows.

CITY TO CHANGE TAX ASSESSING PLAN SOON

The city of Eagle Lake will, beginning with the new year, adopt the Sonner system of assessing and collecting taxes, the same system now in use in the city of Houston.

At the same time the city will separate the offices of city marshal and assessor and collector. That of assessor and collector. This will be an appointive office. We learn that Mr. R. E. Walker will be an applicant for this office. He is a splendid accountant and will make the city a number one officer should he receive the appointment. The salary of the city marshal's office will be fixed at \$50.00 per month in addition to regular cost fees in all arrest cases. The office of deputy city marshal, after this time, will be abolished.
