Club Reporter."

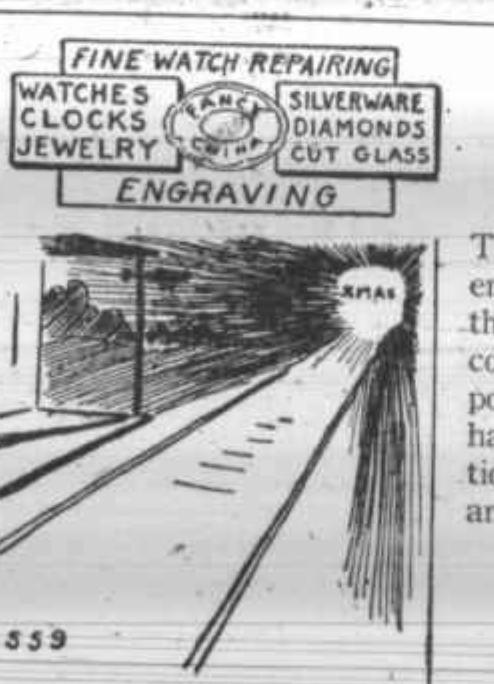
The Grandi Stock Company,
