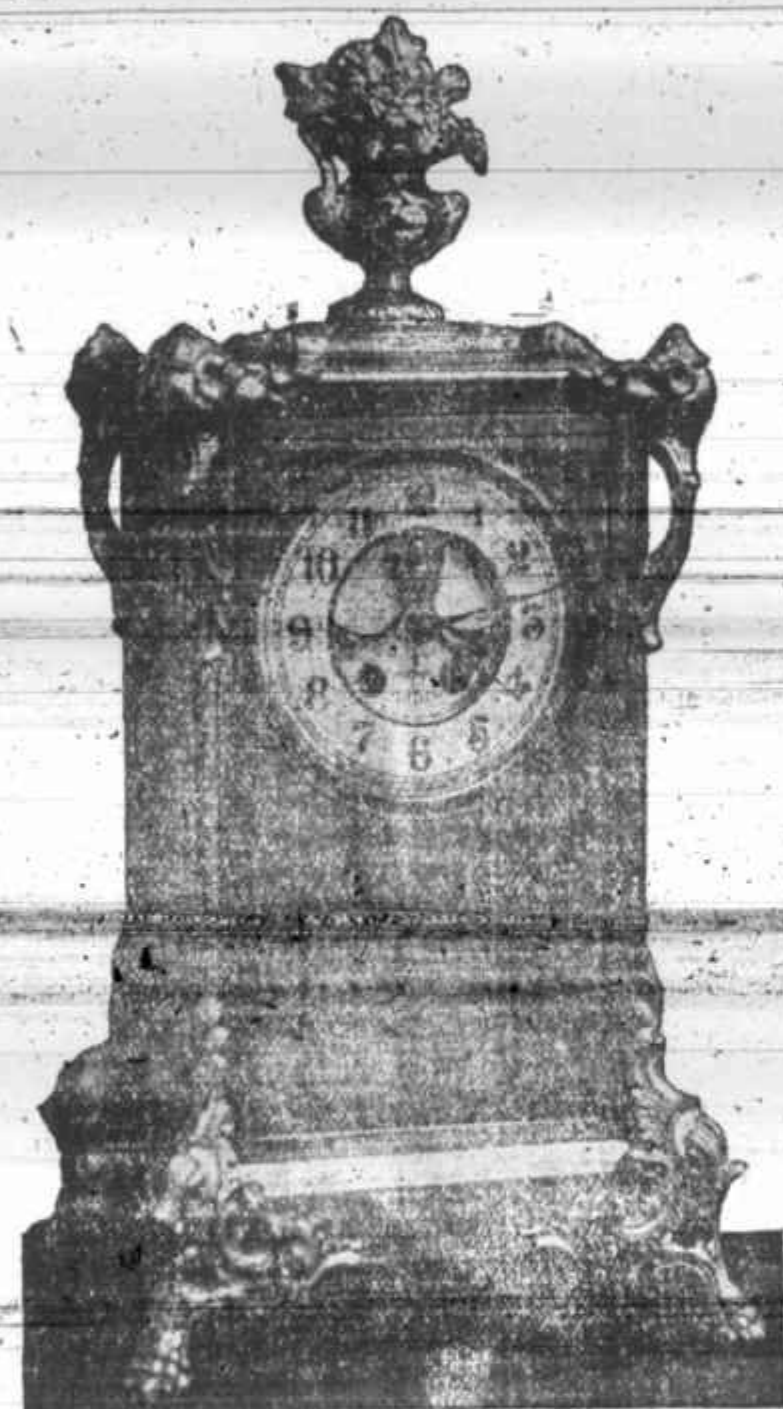

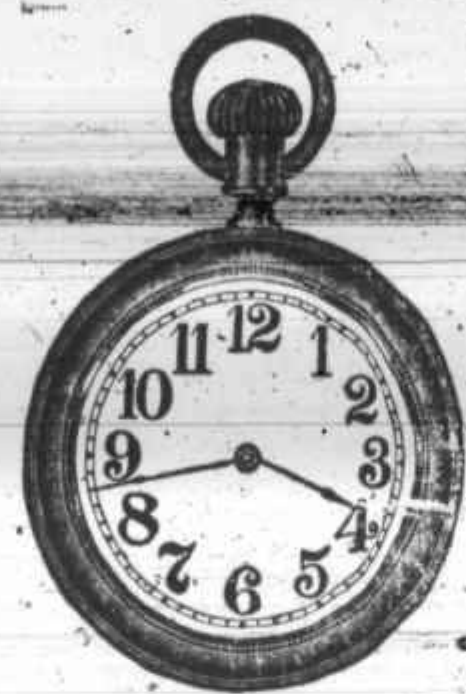

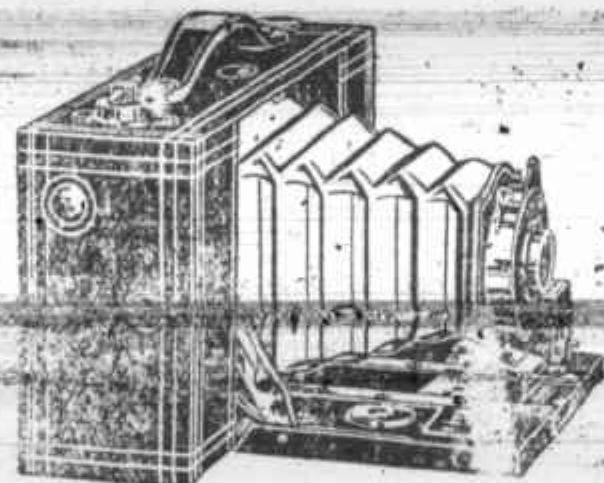

AND HE A NEGRO

To those who have meekly accepted what fate has ordained for them, and ceased battling for a larger enjoyment of what nature has provided in ample abundance for all earth's children, the story that comes from South Carolina is presented as an object lesson, if not an inspiration. A colored farmer in that state became possessed with a desire to do something more than a day laborer. He went largely to the enrichment of some one else, so he invested forty dollars in a horse and rented a piece of land. He worked hard and trimmed his expenses to his actual necessities, and at the end of four years he was able to purchase seven acres of land and pay sixty-nine dollars for a mule. Quite a number of people, and many of them not negroes either, would, on having attained this much, been content to spend the balance of their earthly existence in holding and working the mule and the seven acres, but the South Carolina negro in four years had learned that neither a man's color nor his political predilections, nor his church affiliation, were essential to success, he set the goal higher than a one-man farm—and a mule. Today he owns a \$40,000 plantation and

for twenty-two years has saved an average of three thousand dollars a year. He employs something like 200 hands and his credit ranks with the most prosperous farmers in the state.

The incident is a notable one from many angles. First it may be taken to prove that opportunities for becoming not only prosperous but wealthy are still present in this land which some of us have begun to believe belonged entirely to the trusts; then it indicates that opportunity is no respecter of persons, but answers to the determined effort of anyone who is willing to substitute effort for theory and hard work for pleasant dreams, and while this by no means exhausts the list of lessons taught by the incident, it points out very plainly that there is plenty from a change of soil, that all roads to affluence do not lead from or thru the city.

From every Southern city comes the story of increased negro population. The complaint of the North and East that the farms were being abandoned because of the supposed better advantages and wider opportunities offered by the city is being paralleled in the South. In the former the boys and girls are hurrying to the cities as the places where opportunities are born, and in the South the prospect of higher wages is attracting the negroes to the city, only to discover that while wages may be higher than in the country, expenses keep close on the heels of the pay envelope and the end of the year finds him pretty near the spot from whence he expected to make his start toward prosperity.

It is about time that the lesson was learned that it is not the place nor the environment that constitutes the most important factor in the making of a successful career, but it is the man. Padegewski, the great pianist whom we call a marvel, says that his art consists in practicing sixteen hours a day. As someone has stated it, genius is but another name for hard work.

While it may be true that a great many men have dated the beginning of their prosperity from a change of location, it is also true that a great many more have grown wealthy by remaining in one place and exemplifying that it was better to be doing something for nothing than to be doing nothing for nothing. True it may be that all men are not constituted to make successful farmers, but there are altogether too many who convince themselves that they are fated for failure before they have given the proposition a fair trial. Among these are to be numbered the many failures found doing odd jobs about the city, despondent, pessimistic, disheartened. The earth contains more gold than is found in the mines and the South Carolina negro has indicated that it is possible to get this wealth much easier than by any of the systems of mining so far placed in operation.—Galveston Tribune.
