SIX NEW CHURCHES IN COAST COUNTRY.

Six churches of the Catholic faith have been erected in the Rosenberg, Bay City district, during the past two years. These churches represent the work of Rev. G. A. O. Montreuil, the priest who had been in charge.

The first of the group was completed in May, 1912. It was the Holy Rosary Church at Rosenberg. It is a large church and one of the most substantial of the entire number. The second erected was that of St. Joseph's at Brazoria, Brazoria County. It was dedicated in October, 1912. The following month the church of St. Agnes, at Velasco, Brazoria County was finished.

Three churches have been erected during this year. The first of these was the Sacred Heart Church in Wadsworth, Fort Bend County. A large service was held at the dedication of this church in April, 1913, when many people from a distance were present.

Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church, at Eagle Lake, Colorado County, was completed in August. It is a brick structure and is probably the most elaborate of the entire group. The last church to be completed was St. Patrick's Church in Missouri City. This was dedicated in September.

The construction of these churches, all within two years, is a record that is seldom found in this section of the country. Each organization has a large membership and much pride is taken in the new buildings.

STREET COMMISSIONER BEGAN WORK ON FIRST

City Boys Team of Mules and Em-ploys Street Commissioner For Working Streets of City.

Mr. J. J. Shever and family of Sealy have moved to Eagle Lake and are occupying one of Mr. McClanahan's rent houses in the western part of town. Mr. Shever has recently been appointed city street commissioner by the city council, having begun his duties in this capacity on the first of January. Mr. Shever is an experienced man in road work, having had charge of this kind of work in building some of the important additions to the city of Houston, and has also had similar experience in Weimar. The council will pay him a regular monthly salary and he will be on the job the year round. The city has recently purchased a team of mules, and Mr. Shever will employ one extra man regularly in this work. A regular street man on the job all the time is something the city has needed for a long time, in order to keep street repairs up after the improvements have been made. Mr. Shever's first work is fixing up and improving the bad places in the square. While everything is in such a wet and soggy condition he is not permitted to go ahead with the work as he wants to, but will begin at once in cleaning and digging out all the ditches in the town so as to afford the city streets a good drainage, and just as quickly as things dry off sufficiently will proceed with the street improvement work.
