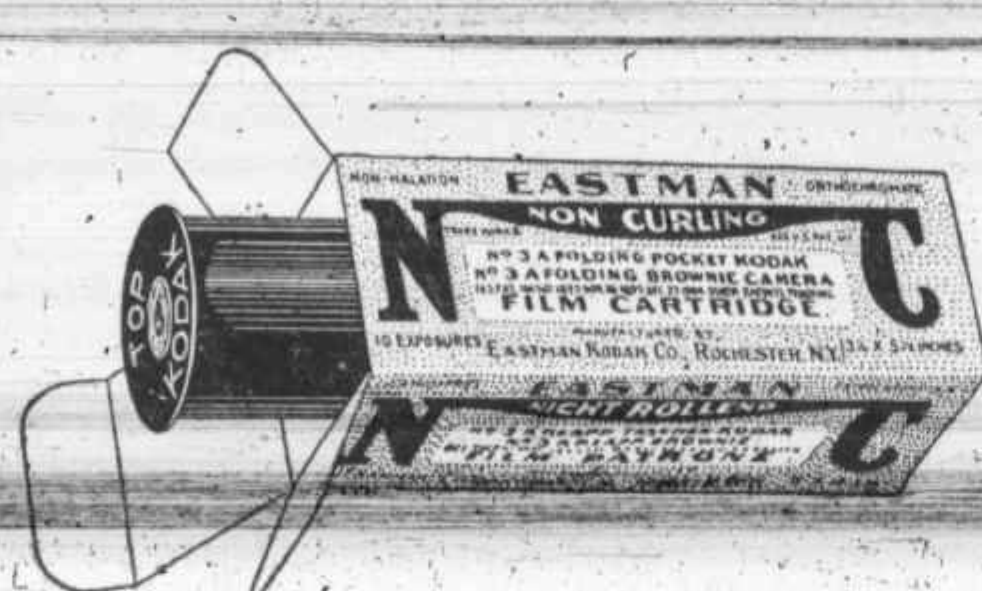

THE PRIMARY BALLOTS

WILL BE DESTROYED

Chairman Dromgoole of the White Man's Party Says Ballots Will Be Burned After Election.

Chairman of the city white man's party, Mr. J. A. Dromgoole, stated this week that the article in last week's Headlight, of all ballots after the primary, was a good one, and that it was the proper thing to be done. He says that the city primary should be conducted just like it was a legal election, and with as much secrecy. Mr. Dromgoole says there will be no finding out of how any person votes in the coming primary, which will be held on February 24th. He says after the election is held and the results given out, that the ballots will be carefully sealed by the judge of the election and turned over to him as city chairman of the white man's party. These ballots he will place in a safety deposit box at one of the local banks and hold them until after the regular city election in April, at which time they will be taken out and burned publicly in the presence of the people. He deems it a wise idea to not burn the ballots until after the regular city election, as something might come up which would demand a reference to the primary vote. This, however, is not probable, but the ballots will be held until after the regular election in order to be on the safe side, and then they will be publicly destroyed. There will be no need of fear this year of any one knowing how you vote. Vote like you want to, as the ballots will be destroyed, as they should be. A large vote is expected at the primary and much interest is being taken in the city campaign.
