ILLUSTRATED LECTURE AT DIXIE NEXT MONDAY

Next Monday afternoon, February 2nd, at 2 o'clock, at the Dixie Theatre in this city will be given two valuable and entertaining lectures, which will be free to farmers and their families. Ladies and boys and girls of the farm are especially invited to attend. One of the lectures will be given by Mrs. B. Kalb of the Wosumunk Farms, of Houston, who will talk on matters relating to the farm home and surroundings, and give some valuable information on poultry raising, feeding and egg production. Mrs. Kalb will show pictures from her own poultry farm. She is an authority on chickens, turkeys, ducks and geese, and she knows how to tell about them in an entertaining way. The other lecture, also illustrated with picture slides, is from the department of agriculture at Washington. This lecture will be given by every farmer, and especially stock raisers and dairy farmers,

because it deals with silos, the production and cost of silage and construction of silos, and because it shows that farmers can increase the value of their farms and farm products more quickly through the proper use of silos than in any other way. This discussion will be conducted by the county demonstration agent. Farm people, don't fail to attend, no matter how busy you are; and bring the wife and girls and boys with you. Malcomson of Houston, all of whom were with him at the time of his death except Mrs. McDonald. The remains were shipped on Thursday afternoon's Southern Pacific train to the old home in North Dakota, for burial, and were accompanied by Mr. Lenhart.
