Since the streets around the park are much wider than there is any necessity for, in paving, or even in graveling, it will be found that unnecessary street area will add greatly to the first cost of paving or graveling, and also to the upkeep afterward. By cutting off a portion from each of the streets adjacent and adding to the park, the cost of street improvements will be greatly reduced, while the increased size of the park will give better opportunities for making it really attractive. It is not our idea to in any way cast any reflection on the city authorities nor to hamper them in their plans for the city's welfare. Although we live in the "suburbs" we feel as if we were citizens of Eagle Lake, and have its welfare at heart, and like to take pride in its progress.—Eagle Lake Nurseries.

In reference to the above letter, we do not believe the park will get any attention this season. The council seems to be allowing the present planting season to slip by just like the season of last year was allowed to slip by. In fact, to express a candid opinion, we do not feel that the city park is going to get any attention as a park. The council, up to the present time, has shown but little interest in the matter. Probably the council has other views as to improvements over there, but the people want it to remain as a park, and it should be properly fixed up and taken care of. The sooner it is done the better it will be. If the city council sleeps on one matter this season, as it did last season, another whole year will have to elapse before anything can be planted. And we just naturally believe that another year will go by before anything is done—and then another year, and then another year.
