PRECINCT POLL TAXES REACHED 561 MARK

Eagle Lake Now Largest Voting Box in the County; Weimar Drops to Second Place.

The payment of poll taxes in Colorado county exceeds the payment of last year by 124. This year there are in all 2914 poll taxes paid in the county. Last year there were 2790. The total number paid in the Eagle Lake precinct is 561, which is a gain over last year's payment of 521. Weimar drops back to second place with 557, a decrease from last year of 4. Columbus increases this year to 408, from 383 last year, and Eagle Lake goes to first place with 561, over 480 last year.

County Tax Collector Herman Braden was kept busy the last two weeks collecting poll taxes, and especially so the last few days of the month. The last poll tax issued was on Saturday night as the clock was striking eleven, and was issued to Rev. C. F. Stewart, the Methodist pastor at Altair.

Below we print the full poll tax payments at each voting precinct in the county, together with the total number paid in each precinct last year, which shows the increase or decrease at each voting box.

CITY POLL TAX PAYMENTS LARGEST EVER PAID HERE

More City Poll Taxes Paid in Eagle Lake Than in Any Year in History of the City.

At the close of the day last Saturday, the last day for poll tax payments, there were paid in Eagle Lake 285 city poll taxes, the largest number of any year in the history of the city's incorporation. Last year there were 211 city poll taxes paid, which was the largest number of any year up to that time. The increase this year over last year is sixty-six, due to a great extent to the lively city campaign now on and to the further fact that this is county and state election year. Of the total number there are 228 legal white voters who will be entitled to vote in the city primaries. This, however, does not include the overs and unders, which, added to the 228, will put the city's voting strength right at 250. The largest vote ever polled in a city election here at any time in the past was even 200. In the total number of 285, there are about 45 negroes who paid their poll tax.

Mr. J. D. Garmon of Austin, who was a citizen of Eagle Lake some years ago, is in the city, the guest of his brother, Mr. S. Garmon, and wife. Mr. Garmon says he may decide to remain in Eagle Lake here again.
