HOUSTON PARTIES BUY LARGE TRACT OF LAND

Judge Ellwood of Houston Buys 900 Acres Near Eagle Lake From Texas Coast Land Co.

One of the most important real estate transactions which has occurred here during the last twelve months, was consummated last week when Judge H. R. Ellwood of Houston purchased about 900 acres of land owned by the Texas Coast Land Company, of which Senator W. D. McCarver is manager and principal owner.

Judge Ellwood and one or two other parties came out from Houston about ten days ago and made a thorough examination of each separate tract in the body of land which is included in this sale, and pronounced the land as fine as they had seen in South Texas for big orchard development, small fruit and truck raising. The 900 acres is a large portion of the present holdings of the Texas Coast Land Company, and it is believed that the purchase of this land by the Houston parties will be of considerable benefit, not only to Eagle Lake, but will enhance the value of all the acreage in that vicinity.

It is the intention of Judge Ellwood, who is one of the most successful real estate operators in the country, to develop this land, as well as to encourage the growing of other fruit and truck. Figs will be grown to a large extent on account of the fact that we have here at Eagle Lake one of the best fig preserving plants in the country.

While we welcome Judge Ellwood to this field of activity, we are still gratified that Mr. McCarver intends to spend a great portion of his time here in order to finish the sale of the Texas Coast Land Company's property and to co-operate with the settlers as in the past. Mr. McCarver has made his winter home here for several seasons past, and is constantly improving his place on Satsuma Ridge and will continue to spend the winters here.

Judge Ellwood expects to bring to this property a high class of settlers, and his success with other propositions of like nature, indicates that he will accomplish his purpose.
