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CITY WILL BUILD FIRE STATION FOR FIREMEN

Will Erect Two Story Fire Station Opposite Schuhmacher Building, Beginning Monday.

Eagle Lake will get that much needed fire station. At the meeting of the city council on Tuesday morning, it was definitely decided that the building be erected. The fire station will be built on the Walker property opposite the Schuhmacher Company building. It will be a 24x30 two story corrugated iron building. A hall will be on the second floor for the use of the firemen, and one, and possibly two small bed rooms will be erected on that floor. These rooms will be occupied by members of the fire company who will sleep there at night, having an electric connection in this room connecting with the fire bell in the city park, so as soon as an alarm is turned in to the fire station, the electric gong will be sounded, ringing the fire bell in the park at the same time, thus giving the general alarm. The lower floor of the building will have a concrete flooring on which all the apparatus which the firemen have now, or may have in the future, will be kept. The building will be erected by the city and will be rented to the firemen. The firemen have long been in need of such a building, which will not only be a splendid home for the fire boys, but a protection in case of fire to every property owner in the city.

TWO DEAD AND FOUR ILL AFTER EATING SUPPER

Poisoned Food Caused Death of Two and Illness of Four Near Matthews Friday Night.

Melissa Bedford, about seventeen years old, and her nephew, Oscar Warner, about ten years of age, are dead, and Piney Warner, a four year old child of the Warner woman, John Crowder and Wesley Long were made violently ill, after eating something at the home of Piney Warner on the McCarty farm near Matthews. All parties are colored. A short while after eating supper at the Warner woman's home, about seven o'clock in the evening, all who were at the supper table were taken violently ill, the boy dying about one o'clock and the Bedford woman dying about a half hour later. Dr. Fitzgerald was summoned from Eagle Lake and when he reached the scene of the whole sale poisoning, the two above mentioned were dead, and the other four were dangerously sick. After administering medical aid, with the use of stomach pumps, the lives of the other four were saved. That someone had intentionally administered the poison, placing the same in some dish that was served at supper was suspected, as the deaths were of such a sudden nature and all were made sick so soon, that it is hardly believed to have been the result of ptomaine poisoning. Officers at once investigated the case and on Sunday morning N. W. Callison, who is acting in the capacity of constable during the absence of Constable J. M. Callison who is at the hospital in Temple, arrested Nat Parker, colored, in connection with the affair, and he was conveyed to jail in Columbus Sunday afternoon by Sheriff E. B. Mayes. It is said that Parker was arrested on a chain of circumstantial evidence furnished the officers by other negroes living in that section. Justice of the Peace J. K. Davidson, with Dr. T. P. Doole, visited the scene of the poisoning, Judge Davidson holding an inquest over the dead bodies. At the request of District Attorney Lester Holt, Dr. Doole removed the stomach of the boy and same was sent to Houston Sunday afternoon for examination.

CLASS CONFIRMED AT EPISCOPAL CHURCH

Bishop Geo. H. Kinsolving preached a splendid sermon at the Episcopal church last Sunday night, the Bishop's annual visit here. After preaching, the Bishop administered confirmation to a class of five, Mr. and Mrs. Vance Duncan, Miss Kate Pegram, Gladys Brosig, Sophie May Hintz and Joe Billy Westmoreland. Bishop Kinsolving has been coming to Eagle Lake annually for a long time and he has a great many friends here, not only among the members of his own church, but of all churches as well, who are always delighted to hear him on his annual visit to our city.

PROF. HERMAN SCHULTZ DIED MONDAY MORNING

Passed Away at Home of Brother, L. F. Schultz, Monday Morning at Age of Sixty-Five.

Prof. Herman Schultz, died at the home of his brother, Mr. F. L. Schultz, a short distance north of town, Monday morning at 8 o'clock. Prof. Schultz has been making his home here with his brother since last September, having come from Houston, Texas, where he had been for some time. He was sixty-five years of age and leaves five children to mourn his death. His wife preceded him in death ten years ago at Beaumont. Her death was a great shock to him, from which he never fully recovered, and since her death has traveled from state to state teaching music and making violins, as fine ones as man ever drew a bow across. He left three very fine instruments of his own making with his brother, Mr. F. L. Schultz, as a remembrance. Prof. Schultz left Germany in 1870, arriving in Texas the first day of January, 1871, and lived in Bastrop county twenty-eight years. Up to the time of his wife's death, Prof. Schultz was engaged in farming, but after his wife died he went back to his former occupation, that of music teacher and violin maker, which he followed up to the time he came to live at Eagle Lake. Our sympathy is extended Mr. Schultz in the death of his brother.

DECISION IN AD ADAMS BARRAGE SUIT REVERSED

Higher Court Reverses Decision In Ad Adams vs. Sunset Ry. For Damages to Auto.

A decision was rendered by the court of civil appeals in Galveston last week reversing the decision in the Ad Adams case. This is the case of Ad Adams vs. the G. H. & S. A. Ry. Co., wherein the plaintiff, Mr. Adams, sued the said railroad company for \$3,000 for damages to his automobile. Mr. Adams' car was struck by an east bound Southern Pacific passenger train in 1911, and completely demolished. The case was tried at the last February term of district court in Columbus, at which time a verdict was rendered in favor of the defendants, the railroad company. The case was carried to the higher courts by Mr. Adams' lawyers, Carothers, Brown & Wirtz, the court of civil appeals last week reversing the decision made by the district court in Columbus in February. Mr. Adams' car was a Buick, and completely demolished at a crossing over the Southern Pacific between here and Lissie. The reversing of the decision will mean that the case will come up for trial again in the district court at Columbus, but it is not likely that it will be called for trial at the present term of court.
