GIVEN TRIAL FOR WIFE DESERTION

Robert Davis, colored, who formerly worked here for the Eagle Lake Rice Mill, was tried in the county court at Houston Monday morning on a charge of wife desertion. The jury acquitted him after Davis testified that his life had been in danger a number of times because of his wife's temper. Davis was asked how he had been getting along with his wife since they were married in 1905. "We been gettin' on disagreeable," he said. "Yes, sir, she shot at me twice. Did I run? It was all I could do to keep from flying." "Why did you leave your wife?" he was asked. "Because I'm just naturally scared of that woman," he answered. "Just before I left she said she was goin' to kill me, and I said to myself, 'Well, if you don't get me tonight, you ain't goin' to get me at all.' I left and I ain't been back since."

Davis is well known in Eagle Lake, and the incident concerning the shooting at him by his wife, Minnie Davis, will be recalled by many. Davis was arrested in Houston on a charge of wife desertion and we learn had it not been for the fact that several white citizens from Eagle Lake went to Houston and gave the jury the proper light on the affair, the case might have gone pretty hard with him.
