NO FLOOD RELIEF IS CHARGED TO GOVERNOR

"Many a poor work horse will
go happy, many a Texas river
bottom farmer will have a short
crop this year and many a small
farmer who bought his land on
credit will lose all or part of his
land as a result of Governor Col-
quhoun's meddling in the flood-
relief question," said Lee Hughes,
a prominent planter of Richmond.
The governor's action in telling
the world that practically all of
the flood sufferers were tenants
of rich land owners who were
well able to remedy the losses
was a terrible blow to many.

"I know of one man who had
bought a Brazos river farm on
credit and who had it nearly all
paid for, but who had to lose part
of it on account of the great loss-
es he sustained in the flood and
the big outlay he had to make in
order to buy new horses, feed
and seed.

"I can not understand any sane
reason why the United States
government should not aid the
Texas flood sufferers. The gov-
ernment has made appropriations

for the relieving of distress in
California, Ohio and various other
states where aid was needed.
There is no question in my mind
but the government would have
made the paltry appropriation of
\$200,000 in order to insure a full
crop in Texas had it not been for
the influence of Governor O. B.
Colquhoun.

"The government lavishly
spends millions of dollars for
dredging waterways, construct-
ing warships, which when obso-
lete are blown up for the sake of
target practice; but when it comes
to spending a couple of hun-
dred thousand dollars to aid hard
working farmers recover from a
calamity for which they were in
no way responsible, the strings
are tightly drawn around the
government's money bags."--
Houston Post.
