CITIZENS' MASS MEETING TONIGHT IN CITY COUNCIL ROOMS AT 8 O'CLOCK

The Citizens Will Meet Tonight to Plan Further Road Work—To Talk Over Possibility of Rebuilding Bridge—To Plan Entertainment for San Antonio Business Men—To Arrange For Eagle Lake Auto Excursion.

There will be a meeting of the Good Roads Club at the city council room tonight (Friday) at 8 o'clock, to which all the business men and citizens are invited and urged to attend. The business of the recent good roads movement will be gone into, and plans made to further keep up the work of improving the highways. Other important matters will come up before this meeting, one among which is the organization of an Eagle Lake business men's excursion, or an automobile trip to a number of the neighboring towns. This will be in the form of a "get together" visit, and it is hoped that all the business men of the city will give the movement their support and their encouragement. Other towns all over the country are conducting such campaigns and carrying these excursions to success. It is in this line, and it is proposed that at this meeting an effort will be made to "wake up" and put some life into the town. Then the matter of arranging some entertainment for the San Antonio business men will be taken up, at the meeting. The San Antonians, about one hundred of the business men of that city, will visit Eagle Lake next Friday, coming in their special train. All progressive citizens of Eagle Lake are urged to attend the meeting tonight.

ELWOOD STEWART OUT OF CONSTABLE RACE

Mr. Elwood Stewart has withdrawn from the constable's race. Elwood announced some weeks ago for the office, but this week withdraws as a candidate from the race. He says in his withdrawal he is drawing down in favor of no certain candidate—he is simply out of the race. Mrs. John Matthews, one of Eagle Lake's most prominent ladies, met with an accident on Wednesday morning, just before the noon hour, which came near proving of a serious nature. Uery & Son's jewelry store, the machine was in some way thrown in gear, and started forward, knocking Mrs. Matthews down and dragging her under the car up to the J. Nathan & Sons' store, at which place the car turned to the right and ran into one of the large posts around the park, damaging the front end of the car and smashing out the lights. Mrs. Matthews was taken into the Nathan store and medical aid summoned, later being taken to her home on Prairie Avenue. She was badly bruised and suffered much pain from the accident. Her back was severely wrenched and has since been very painful. It is believed that the wheels did not touch any part of her, except one foot, which was run over by one of the rear wheels of the car. The shoe was torn and twisted, and the foot painfully injured. Mr. Matthews was in the country at the time of the accident, but was telephoned and made a hurried trip to town. Mrs. Matthews indeed had a narrow escape, and her friends are rejoicing that her injuries, though painful enough, are no worse.

SAN ANTONIO BUSINESS MEN ARE COMING TO EAGLE LAKE FRIDAY

In Special Train of Four Sleepers, Buffet Car and Diner, With San Antonio Military Band, One Hundred Business Men of San Antonio Will Visit Eagle Lake Next-Friday Morning.—Entertainment Planned.

The San Antonio business men's excursion is coming to Eagle Lake next Friday. The excursionists are coming in a special train and a dining car. They are scheduled to reach here next Friday morning over the Southern Pacific, and will arrive here at 9:51 o'clock, departing at 10:30. They are bringing with them the San Antonio Military Band, which will furnish music during their stay. In the party there will be about one hundred of the business men of the Alamo City, members of the Manufacturers' and Jobbers' League of that city, the excursion being operated under the direction of the Chamber of Commerce of that city. They have an advertisement in today's issue of the Headlight asking that the people whom they are here. The object of the excursion, as they state in their advertisement, is a friendly visit, a "get together" trip. At the citizens' meeting to be held tonight at 8 o'clock in the city council rooms this matter will be talked over, and just what manner of entertainment to be provided for the visitors will be decided upon. It is hoped that all the business men of the town will attend this meeting tonight.
