

MUCH UNDUE ALARM OF SMALLPOX SITUATION

All Cases of Smallpox Here Are Well Under Control and All in Detention Camp.

Considerable excitement has been felt here this week over the smallpox situation, some of which unduly so. The excitement caused here this week over the situation has demoralized business, people in the country getting the impression that smallpox had gotten to be regular epidemic in town and are afraid to come here. There is smallpox all over the state, and from our exchanges printed in towns in which the disease is prevalent, we see that but little uneasiness is felt in any of the towns where it exists, and mighty little publicity is given it. There have in all been about twenty cases in Eagle Lake, and of which have recovered and have been turned loose, and one death, that of John Gaunt, who left his home and exposed himself to the weather with the disease upon him. Five cases, all negroes, are now in the detention camp in Highland Park and two more cases were taken to the camp from the negro section of town today. These two cases would have been taken to the camp at the same time, the other patients were taken there, but yesterday's spell of weather prevented the city health officer from getting these two patients to the camp earlier. All of these cases mentioned above are negroes. The case of little Miss Baynton McGinnis, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. R. H. Jones, who has been ill with fever for three weeks, has been pronounced as that of a varicella in a very mild form. However, the family believes the disease to be only a slight breaking out caused from the fever due to recent change of climate. The child has in no manner been exposed to smallpox, and since she is about well and no other member of the family has contracted or shown any signs of the disease, the quarantine of this family will likely be raised in a day or two. When the news was circulated Monday that the little girl had developed a case of smallpox, the first case among white people, a mad rush was made by the women and children of the town for the doctors' offices and practically every child in town was vaccinated. It is well that every precaution should be taken, and it is well that all the children should be vaccinated, but the undue publicity given the matter, in proportion to towns which have the disease in far greater number of cases than here, Eagle Lake has been given a black eye from a business standpoint. There is no cause for excitement, and all cases are well under control, and are being detained at the camp and properly looked after by the physicians. It is believed that the disease will be stamped out in a very few days. While some people have given the matter a great deal of concern the past week, others of the more conservative and less excitable class, have given the same little or no attention.
