



NEGRO WOMAN DIED OF SMALLPOX YESTERDAY

Death Due to Smallpox and Other Complications: No New Cases of Disease Developed

The smallpox situation remains about the same as last week, there having been no new cases to develop during the week. There was a death at the detention camp yesterday, that of the wife of Leo Christian, colored, who died of smallpox and a complication of other troubles. There are now six cases of the disease in the camp, which was just the same as last week with the exception of the death that occurred yesterday. City Health Officer J. K. Davidson is giving strict attention to the smallpox situation. All the excitement has subsided and there seems to be no interest taken in the matter now whatever, in fact you hear it even seldom spoken of in any manner. As we stated in our last week's issue, some of our people had become unduly excited when little Miss Hayinton McGinnis developed a case of something nothing more than chickenpox, but all the excitement has blown over, the little girl up and well in a day or two, and the "rigid embargo" over that home has been lifted. There is not the slightest alarm felt over the spreading of the smallpox among the negroes, since all patients are isolated in the detention camp, and there has not been a single case among the white people.
