EAGLE LAKE INJUNCTION CASE IS AFFIRMED BY COURT OF APPEALS

Court of Civil Appeals Sitting at San Antonio Entered Judgment Affirming
Judgment of District Court in the Case of John H. Kirby vs. the Lake-
side Irrigation Company Concerning Lowering Waters of the Lake.

The Court of Civil Appeals sitting at San Antonio on last Wednesday, the 15th inst., entered judgment affirming the judgment of our District Court in the case of John H. Kirby vs. the Lakeside Irrigation Company. This is a suit brought by Mr. Kirby of Houston, against the irrigation company to restrain them from lowering the natural level of the waters of Eagle Lake.

Mr. Kirby owns approximately one half of the land lying beneath the waters of the lake, and he based his suit on the fact that he was such owner and that the irrigation company was practically draining the water from his land in irrigating rice each pumping season and practically rendering his property worthless.

The suit was first filed in the

spring of 1912, and Judge Kenyon issued a temporary injunction on plaintiff's application. A final trial of the case was not reached until September, 1913, at which time the injunction order was made permanent. The Irrigation Company appealed from this order with the result as stated. Mr. W. L. Adkins of Columbus represented the irrigation company and Carothers, Brown & Wirtz of this city represented Mr. Kirby in the proceedings.

For two seasons the irrigation order has been in effect, the irrigation company obtaining water from the Colorado river and through the lake in accordance with their charter for irrigation purposes.

The high water during the overflow of the past winter is said

to have washed out the greater number of alligators and gars, and this spring the lake has come into its own again as the finest fishing resort in Texas.

As we understand the case, the irrigation company can yet carry it to the supreme court, and should that court also affirm the judgment, then the matter will have been settled. People all over this section of the state are watching the final outcome of the case. We learn that parties are now ready to improve the lake and its fishing, and the pleasure resort of the lake. A company, so we are informed, will be organized for this purpose, but the move is lying dormant at the present time, the promoters awaiting the final decision in the case.

HIKERS FROM MEXICO TO NEW YORK CITY WITH SEVEN BURROS ARE HERE

Two Discharged Soldiers on 4250 Mile Walk Passed Through Eagle Lake This Morning; On no
Wager, "Just More Time Than Money."

Lattower, two discharged United States soldiers, traveling with seven burros, making a trip overland from Juraz, Mexico, to New York City, were here this morning. They received their discharge from the army while in Honolulu, since which time they have been doing two years' patrol duty on the border. They left Juraz on February eighth. When asked this morning by a Headlight reporter the nature of their 4250 mile hike, Mr. Sacks replied, "Well, there isn't much to it. We are just two discharged United States soldiers and we are making the hike for our own pleasure. We are making our expenses along the way by selling Mexican post-card views, and it is our intention to visit all the army camps along the way. Our next stop will be at the army camp at Texas City." "Has your trip so far been a pleasant one?" was asked. "Not altogether," replied the soldier. "The hardest part of our hike was in the hills near Langhtry, where we were lost for eight days. We were without food and came nearly starving to death. Here

we lost four of our burros, having begun the trip with eleven. They make an average about thirty miles a day, and ride on the burros on an average of about five miles each day, giving them a rest. "Mexico," a big fine Shepard dog accompanies them. Both of the soldiers seemed very fond of the dog and stated that he was undoubtedly the finest dog on earth. "What time do you expect to reach New York?" was asked by the Headlight man. "Well, that's hard to tell," replied the soldier, "as we have plenty of time, just odds of it, and we are not hiking on any wage or time bet; we are just taking our good old time, and don't care much when we get there. By the way, mail is a copy of your paper to Rosenberg, where we will be tomorrow, for we'd like to keep the paper among the other articles collected on our trip, and it will be a pleasure to look over it in years to come after we are in New York, and have forgotten about this 4250 mile jaunt," remarked Mr. Sacks as the Headlight reporter was leaving their camp on the Southerr Pacific track near the old lively stable building.

SMALLPOX SITUATION WAS WELL HANDLED

City Health Officer Davidson Deserves Credit For His Manner
of Handling Situation.

There was a death in the detention camp from smallpox, last week, that of Lucinda Johnson, about 70 years of age, which occurred last Friday. The remains were interred in the colored cemetery. Dr. J. K. Davidson, city health officer, stated that all patients in the camp are now doing as nicely as could be expected, and that unless other new cases develop in the meantime, all cases now in the camp will be released in a short while. Speaking of the situation, Dr. Davidson stated that both Mr. and Mrs. Jones were recovering rapidly and will soon be well. The doctor feels very encouraged over the smallpox situation here now, and believes that in a very short time all patients will have fully recovered, and the detention camp discontinued. The excitement over the spreading of the disease has subsided to a great extent, there still being a few who are yet afraid to venture outless they are stricken with the disease.
