EAGLE LAKE WINS TWO FROM SCHULENBURG

Schulenburg is Outplayed in Two
Games at That Place by Eagle
Lake This Week.

Schulenburg is a good baseball
town. There are lots of fans in
that town and large crowds wit-
nessed both games there on Mon-
day and Tuesday between Schu-
lenburg and Eagle Lake. There
were lots of fans at Monday's
game, but they did not have much
opportunity to "perform" as the
game was a crushing defeat for
Schulenburg from the very first
inning, and while the score was
9 to 5, in reality it should have
been 10 to 0. Schulenburg did
not make a single earned run.

Schulenburg's first run was
made in the sixth inning, when a
batter hit one through the first
base line. It was thrown wild to
second. Another wild throw to
third. Another wild throw and
the runner crossed the home
plate. "Was a bunch of wild
throws in succession that scored
Schulenburg's first one, and such
a yell you never heard before
went up from the sideline. In the
eighth Eagle Lake had an
unsuccessful inning. With
out two long drives were
on account of the sun
players' eyes, which
costly wild throw
out among the

automobiles on the sideline, scored
four runs. In the sixth inning
Waddell was making a forced run
from third home. The ball was
thrown to Schulenburg's catcher.
The catcher "muffed" the ball
and Waddell was duly safe at
home. But "His Umps" did not
see the catcher miss the ball,
said he thought he caught it, and
couldn't change his decision. We
never like to kick against an um-
pire, but that decision was about
the rankest we have ever seen
made in a ball game. "Chief"

Chapman was in line trim and the
Schulenburgers couldn't find
him, allowing them but two hits,
while Eagle Lake had seven big
ones up to their credit, of which
Will Craft secured a three base
hit, and Tom Waddell a three
bagger, a two base hit and a sin-
gle. Boots Walker connected
with every ball he swung at, but
had a little hard luck, flying out
each time on long drives to deep

for by the Eagle Lake team in
the sixth, scored five runs, and
Schulenburg went "up in the air."
"Chief" Choleau killed fourteen
Schulenburgers at the bat in the
first seven innings. He never said
a word, but chewed a big wad of
either gum or tobacco, we don't
know which, but he pitched ball,
and connected with one for a long
clean hit to left field. When
Schulenburg's star batter took
the bat to the fifth, Anselm at
first called over to the pitcher.
"Chief, that fellow says you have-
n't got anything, show him."
"Chief" uttered not a word, only
smiled and took a bigger chew.
One, two, three he sped them over
the home plate that even on the
sideline you couldn't see 'em, and
the star batter that had said

"Chief" didn't have anything
dropped his bat. While we have-
n't space to give the game a more
detailed write-up, we are forced
to tell about Tom Waddell's work
behind the bat. That boy is a
wonder and he's going to make
the big league some of these days
—if he wants to. Why, such a
thing as letting a ball by him at a
critical moment is a stranger to
him. He gets everything that
comes within six feet of him, and
when he takes the batter's posi-
tion you can hear the fans yell-
ing, "D-M-A-r he goes." The score
by innings was as follows:
Eagle Lake 100230100-9
Schulenburg 000001040-3
The second game at Schu-

burg Tuesday afternoon between
the same teams resulted in another
victory for Eagle Lake, the
score being 10 to 8. This makes
three straight games against
Schulenburg for Eagle Lake. We
expected to give a full account of
the second game, but our report-
er who had promised to furnish
us with a write-up "fell down on
his job," so all we know about
that second game was that Eagle
Lake won in the score above given.
