EAGLE LAKE WILL HAVE A FARMERS' INSTITUTE

State Department of Agriculture Will Conduct Farmers' Institute Here on April 30th.

A letter to the Headlight from the State Department of Agriculture at Austin, says: "Under the direction of the State Department of Agriculture, a Farmers' Institute will be held in Eagle Lake on Thursday, April 30th, at 1:30 p. m. The place of meeting will be announced by the local committee. This institute will be conducted by Mr. Paul Wipprecht, who will discuss diversification, rotation, seed selection and better culture methods. Officers of the institute already organized will please assist in getting the farmers out to hear these important questions discussed. The State Department of Agriculture publishes, from time to time, valuable reports upon topics of vital interest to the farmers of the State. All institutes will receive copies of all bulletins and reports. These institutes are farmers' meetings devoted to the upbuilding of the best interests of the farmer. It is urged, therefore, that farmers bring their families and devote at least one day to a careful study and discussion of the agricultural questions which lie near their hearts."
