## How They Treat The Convicts in Colorado.

When a man is developed who has a large modicum of common sense, and is unhampered by tradi-tions and free from prejudices in favor of antiquated methods sim-ply because they once were, the world does well to lay hold on him.

The governor of Colorado found such a man a few years ago in the person of a commercial travel-er named Tynan, and made him superintendent of the state peni-tentiary.

He proceeded forthwith to shock all the believers in grates and chains and guns and dogs and straps. He opened dark cells, swept out and made storerooms of dungeons, put guns and stripes

than 300 convicts out to building mountain roads under the blue sky, without a chain of a guard. He said to them: "Treat me fair and I will treat you fair. I will put you on your honor. Keep faith with me and your stripes will be taken off; no guns will be held over you; you will not be locked in cells, and for every thirty days you work ten hours, ten days will be taken off your time."

In the several years he has followed the plan fewer than one-half of 1 per cent of the men have broken faith with him. He has built roads for the state of Col-orado for one-third of what they would have cost by private con-tract, has introduced new indus-tries into prison, opened new farms and turned back 50,000 of the appropriation made for the prison.

He writes letters to the men, on plain stationery, after they leave

and helps them to get jobs, and keeps in touch with them in every possible way. He says, he has faith in humanity and never in-tends to lose it. When the men go out they are healthy and strong and self-respecting. They carry no marks of the chain or bat, nor the memory of the degrad-ing stripes.

He allowed a "lifer," whom his predecessor had tried to "re-form" with the dungeon and ball and chain and bread and water, to go unguarded to Denver, visit the governor spend a day or more in the city and come back, trust-ing in his word; and he kept faith and came back to work.

The Chronicle appreciates, of course, that the negro and Mexi-can element in Texas prisons make the situation very differ-ent here but some Tynan's com-mon sense and independence and humanity would be a great im-provement in Texas.

The convicts of Joliet, Ill., are issuing a paper, The Prison Post, the material for which is contrib-uted by prisoners. They have to get it printed outside the peni-tentiary, however, as a sea rich among the 2,150 convicts in the pen failed to reveal a single prin-ter.

Editors were minus also, and they had to get a real estate man to edit the paper. There are bankers, preachers, doctors, and merchants among the convicts, but as an exchange remarks, "occasionally you will see a prin-ter enter a saloon, but not the penitentiary."

The following account of Wed-nesday's game is taken from the San Antonio Express:

Yoakum, Tex., April 29.—Yoakum got to Eagle Lake's Indian pitcher in the tenth today and won its seventh straight game, 2 to 1. Batteries: Yoakum, Sellman and Stark; Eagle Lake, Choteau and Waddell. Hits, off Sellman 5, off Choteau 6; struck out, by Sell-man 12, by Choteau 11; umpire, Moquillon.
