GOOD ROADS GRAVEL CO. IN HANDS OF RECEIVER

The Good Roads Gravel Company of Glidden, in which company several Eagle Lake citizens are interested, has been placed in the hands of a receiver by order of Judge M. Kennon. Mr. J. F. Sandmeyer was appointed receiver. The action of the court is said to have been taken upon petition of J. Mattern, who is a creditor of the company to the amount of about \$200, and was represented by Judge Mansfield, who went before the district judge at Semin with the matter. The company is said to have valuable assets in gravel beds and about \$10,000 to \$15,000 worth of machinery and railroad tracks. The receiver was given authority to issue \$200 worth of certificates, which is believed will be sufficient to enable him to contract and continue to get gravel in the market.
