A BIG CHICKEN SNAKE IN BUGGY WITH WOMAN

Large Snake Crawls From Under
Buggy Seat While Mrs. Thomas
is Driving to Town.

While driving to town last Sat-
urday from her home four miles
in the country, Mrs. Henry C.
Thomas had an experience, of
which she hopes to never go
through again. When about a
half mile from her home a large
chicken snake about five feet long
crawled out from under the
buggy seat across her feet. The
snake crawled up the dash board
of the buggy and standing about
a foot higher than the dash board
looked Mrs. Thomas in the face.

SECOND AUTO SCHEDULE TRIP NEXT WEDNESDAY

First Day's Trip Delayed by Rain
but Second and Third Trips
Will be Carried Out.

The first of the three automobile
excursions arranged by the Eagle
Lake business men, which was
to have taken place Wednesday,
was rained out. When it was
learned here last Friday that the
Columbus bridge had washed
out, the town was cut out of the
schedule as there was no way to
reach the place on the proposed
route. An effort was made to
see if Altair could be reached by
way of Garwood. Two cars went
over the route Monday, but reported
the roads between Garwood
and Altair in such bad shape that it
would be but foolish to attempt
the trip. The excursionists then
decided to visit the other towns,
Garwood, Nada, Eldridge, Mat-
thews and Calhoun, but the heavy
downpour of rain Tuesday after-
noon and night threw a damper
over the first day's trip, which
was postponed until a later date.
The second trip next Wednesday,
to Chosterville, Lissie, Nottawa,
East Bernard and Wallis, will be
made according to schedule. The
excursion party will leave here
promptly at 7:30 next Wed-
nesday, and the day's program
will be carried out in strict ac-
cordance with the published sched-
ule.

The people at Bernardo are ar-
ranging for a big reception for
the Eagle Lake trade excursionists
at that place on Wednesday, May
27th. A test, basketball game, trap
shooting, etc., will be among the
number of the day's program.
Word has been received by mem-
bers of the Eagle Lake Business
League that a large crowd will
be in Bernardo on that day. People
will be there from all around that
section of the country, from Cat
Spring, New Elm, Ellinger and
other places. A great time at
Bernardo is in anticipation by
the excursionists.

HEAVY RAIN ON TUESDAY DELAYS POTATO WORK

Rainfall Over Potato Section Has
Delayed Digging—Damage
to Crop Reported Slight.

A heavy downpour of rain
throughout this territory Tues-
day afternoon will delay potato
digging for several days, and in
some cases a week or more. Some
of the planters are of the opinion
that the rain will be a good thing
for the farmers, giving the pota-
toes time to further mature be-
fore digging is resumed. The
rain was fine on all the late pota-
toes insuring a large yield of the
later crops.

The amount of rainfall varied
considerably throughout different
sections of this territory. At
Lakeside the actual gauge was
2.18 inches. At Eldridge 4.25
inches. Mr. C. M. Davis at that
place reports that possibly only
a little additional damage has
been done to the potato crop.
At the Engelhard place the ac-
tual rainfall was 2.50 inches. The
damage at that place is the crop
in uncertainty, and it is predicted
that the rain will interfere with
the future growth of the spuds.
At Calhoun Briscoe & Terrell
report no additional damage, and
estimate the rainfall at 2.50
inches. Mr. C. M. Womack esti-
mates a 3.75 inch rain at his farm.
The damage in this locality is
uncertain, but Mr. Womack says
there will be some damage. At
Egypt Mr. Dupen estimates the
rainfall at 2.50 inches, with only
a small amount of damage unless
more rain follows. About four
inches fell at Wharton, delaying
digging in that locality for about
ten days. Shipping began from
Wharton last Monday, but only
in local lots.
