ROY CHOUTEAU, INDIAN PITCHER, WAS SHOT TO DEATH YESTERDAY AT MOULTON BY BASEBALL MANAGER

"Chief" Chouteau, Who Pitched For Eagle Lake Ball Team This Season, Was Killed in Moulton Yesterday By Jim Robins.

Roy Chouteau, of French Indian descent, who came to Eagle Lake from Oklahoma as pitcher for the local baseball team, was shot and killed in Moulton yesterday evening about six o'clock by Jim Robins, manager of the Moulton baseball team. A number of conflicting reports of the tragedy have been received here, but the following telephoned this morning by Tom Waddell, who left last night for Moulton for the

ball player, as the best that he had been able to learn upon his arrival there.

Robins, the Moulton club manager, and Chouteau, became involved in a fuss on the streets, the nature of which was not learned. It is said that Chouteau had a knife in his hand and Robins was armed with and age handle, throwing the handle at Chouteau, who continued to advance on him with the knife. Robins, it is said, then backed into a saloon, drew his pistol and fired two shots. The first shot struck the Indian in the heart, the second being a glancing shot, slightly breaking the skin across the chest. Chouteau died instantly.

Tom Waddell, who was accompanying Chouteau, stated that he had been coming back to Eagle Lake and resume his position on the Eagle Lake team, that he had been there a month and liked Eagle Lake best. While the nature of the trouble is not known, it is believed to have resulted in Chouteau's desire to quit the Moulton team and return to Eagle Lake.
