LEVEE DISTRICT MAY BE CREATED ALONG RIVER

Forming District and Building 15
Miles of Levees Along Colo-
rado Is Being Discussed.

The proposition is being talked
among property owners along
the Colorado river of forming a
levee district for the issuance of
bonds and building a levee along
the river to protect the low-land
farms from future overflows.

Civil Engineer G. R. Abney is
speaking of the matter is of the
opinion that the project can be
carried out for \$150,000. To
properly levee as to give the low
lands protection, the levee work
would be begun above the Aransas
Pass bridge and continue on
down the river to the Wharton
county line. It is said that such
a district could be formed by be-
coming a part of the project and
forming a strip of land about
a mile wide down the river, while
at some of the very lowest land
points extending the district lines
out possibly wider than a mile.

It is estimated that the work can
be done with fifteen miles of
levee. This estimate is made
believing that the Faber-Mercan-
tile Company would turn its
leaves through the Eldridge place
over to the levee district. With-
out including the Eldridge levee,
it would, of course, require more
than fifteen miles of levee work.
The Eldridge levee it is said,
cost about \$25,000 and that same
can be put in good condition
again for five or six thousand
dollars. To create this district,
it is said, a bond issue for about
25 percent of the assessed valua-
tion of the land in said district
will have to be voted. It is be-
lieved by some who are giving
the matter considerable thought
that \$20.00 per acre throughout
the district will pay all costs of
the work. This, it is estimated,
will be about one year's actual
rent of all the land embraced in
the district. The levee district
proposition, while yet young, is
being freely discussed by the
people throughout this section.
Should the matter become a
reality and the \$150,000 secured
and brought into this territory
and turned loose here during the
winter for labor, it will help mat-
ter greatly in a business way
during these trying times.

THIRD APPLICATION IN FOR POSTMASTERSHIP

Mr. Oliver Brown is circulating
a list which is meeting with lib-
eral signers, asking for the appoint-
ment of postmaster of Eagle
Lake. This will make the third
applicant, Messrs Horace McKee
and Sam H. Little having sent in
their applications for the position
some time ago. Mr. McKee's
application was recommended by
Congressman Burgess, but since
then no further developments
have been heard in the matter.
It is very likely that Capt. Geo.
S. Ziegler will be allowed to fill
the unexpired term of his ap-
pointment, which has yet some-
thing over two years to run.
