SENATOR CLARK SPOKE TO VOTERS LAST NIGHT

Small Audience Heard Senatorial Candidate's Address at Park Here Last Night.

Dr. I. E. Clark of Schulenburg, the present State Senator from this district, and who is a candidate for re-election, addressed the voters of Eagle Lake at the city park last night. A small but appreciative crowd greeted the speaker, and thoroughly enjoyed and seemingly endorsed his remarks. Dr. Clark, in his address, was very emphatic in stating that he was the Senator of the people of the district that he represented and not his own senator. He briefly discussed his course in the past senate, giving his position on all important questions that came up for consideration, and

the past management of the penitentiary system, showing the people where it was costing the State of Texas approximately \$85,000.00 annually to maintain the penitentiary system, the system not being self-sustaining, having put the state in debt about \$3,000,000.00. Dr. Clark stated that he was opposed to submission, but if this district went for submission, he would vote for it when it came up for consideration in the next legislature, but if this district went against submission, he would oppose it, thereby showing clearly to the people that he will be governed by their desires. The doctor made a fine impression on the voters here.

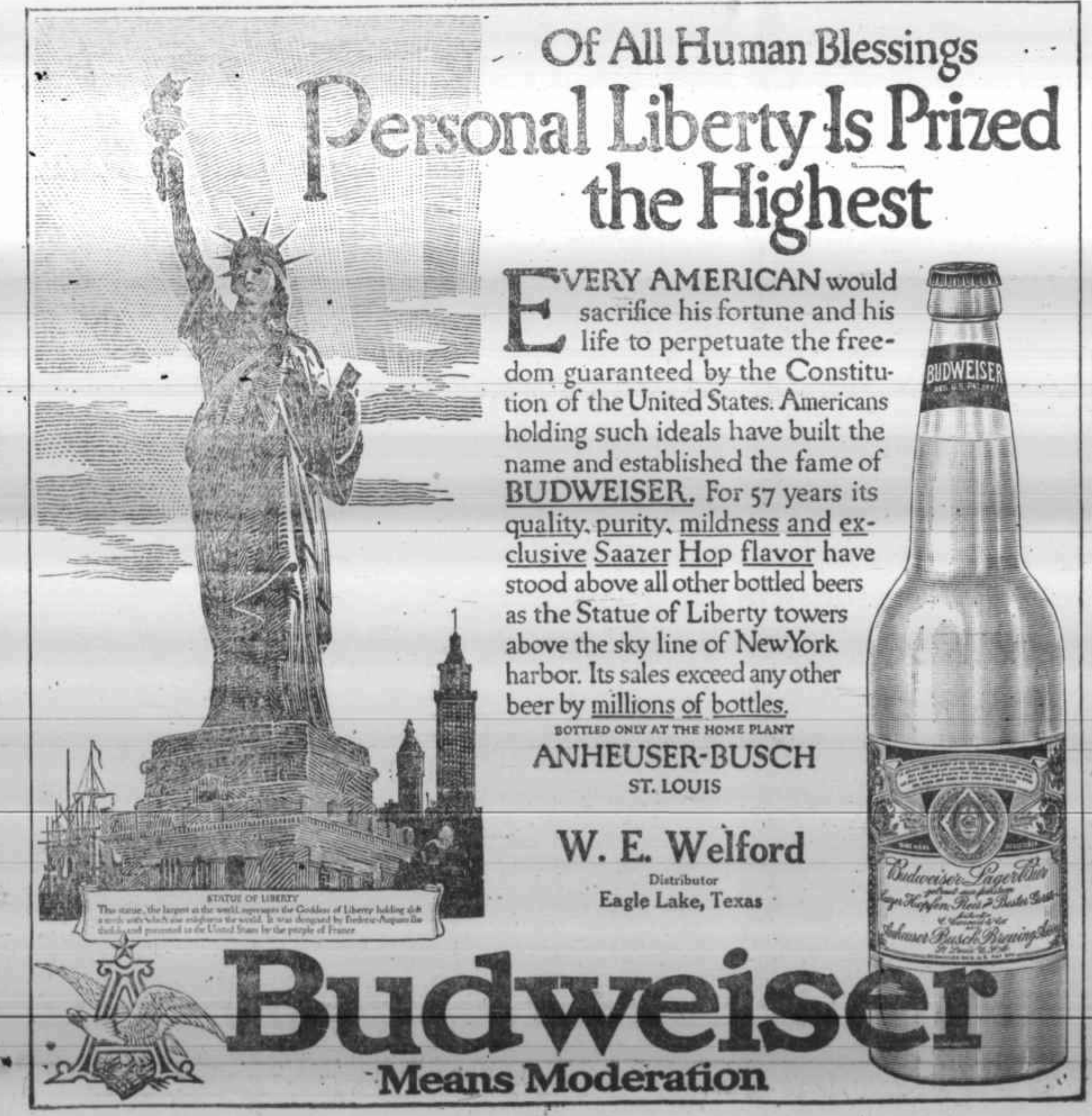
