Yoakum turned tables on us in the second game, Tuesday afternoon, defeating the home team in a score of 6 to 2. Selman, un-

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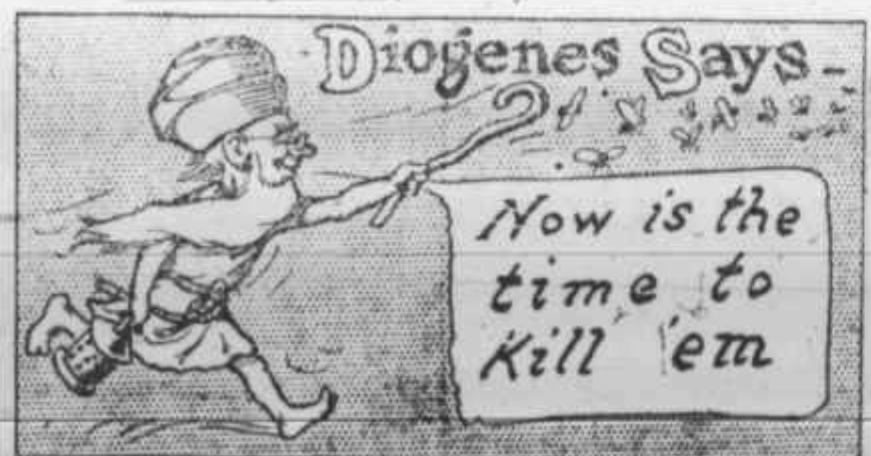
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
