GEO. HERDER BUYS THE EAGLE LAKE RICE MILL

Mill Was Sold at Trustee Sale at Co-
lumbus Tuesday. Will be Operated
During Approaching Season.

To satisfy a deed of trust which
with interest and attorneys' fees
amounted to \$46,200, the trustee
George Herder, Jr., on Tuesday
sold at public auction at the court
house in Columbus the property
of the Eagle Lake Rice Milling
Company, situated in the town
of Eagle Lake, and consisting of
the mill, elevator, machinery,
lots, etc. The property was
bought in by George Herder,
Sr., of Weimar, the holder of the
deed of trust for \$2,500. Mr.
Herder is also president of the
Eagle Lake Rice Milling Company.
At this time Mr. Herder's future
plans have not been fully develop-
ed.

CANE BELT CONDUCTOR DIED SUDDENLY AT SEALY HOME

Conductor P. A. Taylor died
suddenly at his home in Sealy
Tuesday afternoon at half past
one o'clock in the afternoon. Mr.
Taylor had just been down town
and seemed in the best spirits.
Soon after he came home he col-
lapsed. Conductor Taylor was
the oldest passenger conductor
on the Santa Fe railroad. During
the last few years he has had
charge of the Cane Belt branch,
running regularly from Sealy to
Matagorda. Mr. Taylor was
highly esteemed by all who knew
him. He leaves a wife and two
children—a married daughter
and son. The body was taken to
Houston for burial.

Grafting in New York

In the American Magazine
appears the "Diary of a Cop," in
which a New York policeman tells
the story of his adventures.

There about 10,000 cops on
the force, and a low estimate of
the graft paid for protection
when Tammany is in power, and
there is a liberal administration,
is \$2,500,000 a year. There are
one in a hundred of the cops that
get a look-in on the big graft. It
all goes straight to the higher-
ups. Even those who get the
graft don't text it from anybody.
It is given to them freely, and
by the people who are willing
to pay to run a business prohibi-
ted by law.

The ordinary gambling-house
pays \$200 a month, but one of
the biggest and finest in the
country paid \$4,500 to start up.
Two other big houses pay \$1,000
a month. Pool-rooms, stuss and
crap games, and smaller out-
lets all over the city pay from \$200 a
month down to \$50.

The meanest of all the graft
is taken by the cheap district
politicians. Some of them have
interests in the houses, and ho-
tels where people are not required
to have baggage. They not
only get this money, but they
also charge from \$200 a year up
to men and women for selling
newspapers at the subway and
elevated entrances. They invest
to the gambling and disorderly
houses as silent partners.
