I told Mr. Ball," continued the Governor, "that it was for neither of the prohibitionists or the antiprohibitionists to put up the money for the enforcement of the law, and I wrote him that if he would furnish the names of these illegal voters, I would have the legislature appropriate the \$20,000 for this purpose, and further than that I would engage Come Johnson, possibly the best prohibition lawyer in Texas, to prosecute them. What did Ball do then? Why, he crawled. He was only bluffing then, and he's only bluffing now."

"Ball said he resigned his seat in congress, at \$5000 per year, because he could not make a living at it, and entered the duties as a corporation lawyer, but now he is quitting the corporations, who are paying him \$20,000 a year to accept a \$4000 job." Governor Colquitt devoted considerable time to the Houston Club of which he charged Col. Ball with being a stockholder. "Why, that Houston Club poses as a literary institution, but in one month they spent \$130 for literature and \$900 for poker chips." The Governor's address was liberally applauded and seemingly well received.

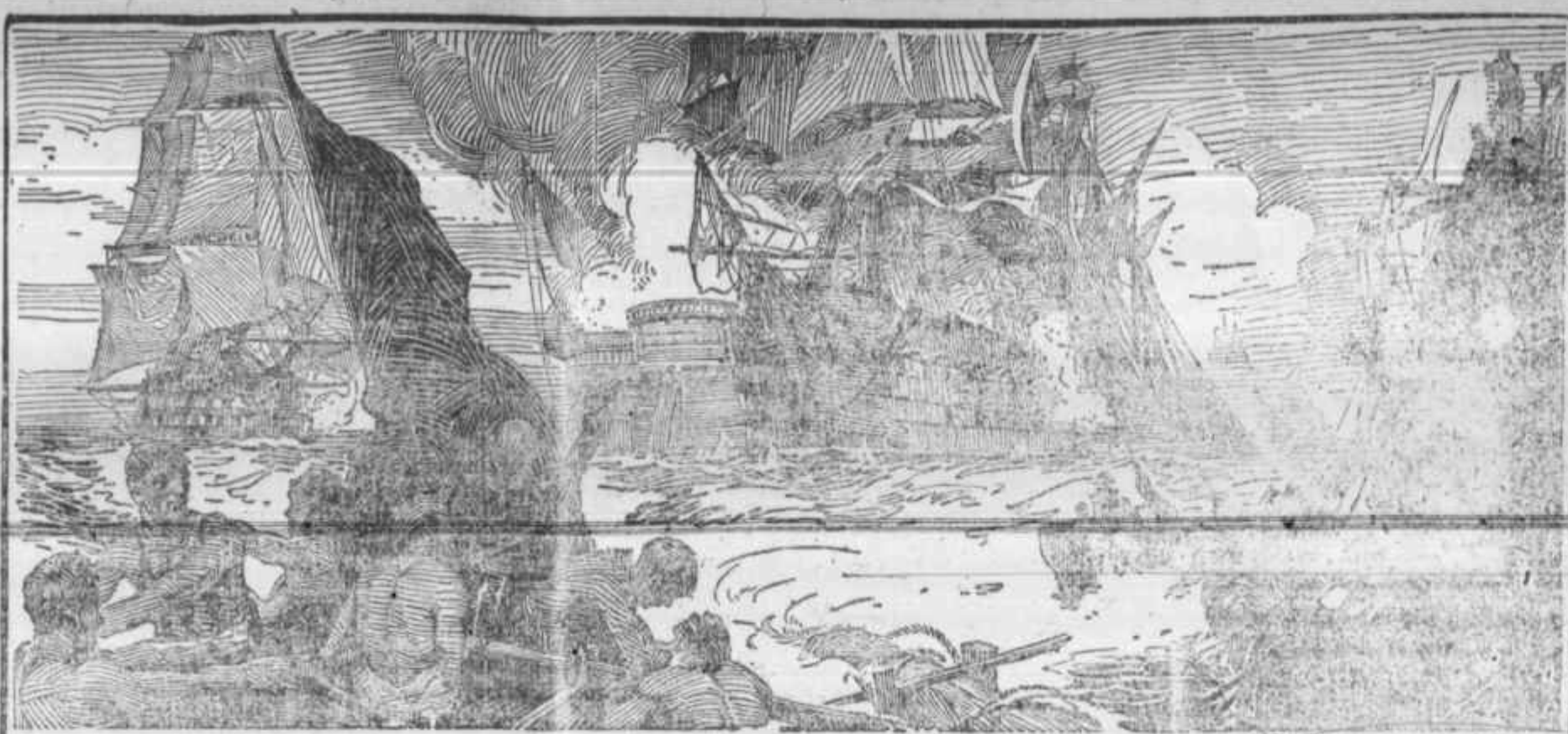

The stockmen are reporting a number of cases of charbon at different points in the county. Some of the cattlemen have lost a number of head of stock in this community and the disease is reported prevalent in all sections of the county. The following concerning the disease is sent from Weimar, Texas, July 7:—A few cases of anthrax, or charbon, have developed among the cattle of this section, and one prominent farmer, John Y. Matthews, has a fully developed case of the disease through infection in skinning the animal. MAY DRILL OIL WELL ON BERNARD NEAR TOWN

DR. DOOLE VISITS HERE; CONDITIONS IN MEXICO

Dr. Doole of United States Army Here Tuesday; Will Resume Practice in Eagle Lake on August First.

Dr. T. P. Doole, who some weeks ago, was called from his practice here to the United States army service, spent Tuesday in the city from Galveston. The doctor, who is at present in the army hospital service, has made a trip to Mexico, and stated that he expected to leave again on Wednesday of this week for that place. Dr. Doole says he fully expected to write the Headlight from Vera Cruz, as he had promised to do, but as he has been on the go all the time since leaving here and as there was simply so much of interest there to write about, he just didn't know where to begin. When asked what the Mexicans thought about the Americans being in control at Vera Cruz, the doctor stated that from his observation they were delighted to have them there and he believed it would be with reluctance that they will see the army leave. The business men there, Dr. Doole says, he has been informed, say that at the present time they are doing the only satisfactory business that they have done for four years.

The doctor stated that the authorities have been having some trouble with some of the prisoners that were released from the dungeons as the American army was taking possession of the city. In one of the dungeons the doctor states there is a large picture of a devil, painted on the plastered wall with human blood. It is said that one of the men in the prison would rub his hand against the rough wall until it would bleed and with his hand painted the devil on the wall. It required a great deal of time to complete the job, and the picture, which is still visible, attracts the attention of all the visitors to that place. In some of the dungeons, the doctor says it is stated through reliable sources, that there were so many men that there was scarcely room on the floors for them to stretch out full length to sleep, and some of these men had been confined therein for twelve and fifteen years without a bath or a change of clothes. While nearly all of the prisoners were turned loose, still some of them were still in the dungeons when the Americans took possession. Some of these the American forces have been working on the roads. Owing to the men on patrol duty it is almost impossible for these men to escape, and they are sent out in squads of from ten to fifteen to do road work, and without guards. It went against the grain with them, states the doctor, to take their bath after leaving the dungeon. They are fed army rations and the doctor says when a squad of probably ten will be sent to road work, they will return at night for rations and the squad will contain all the way from ten to fifteen, the "recruits" having joined and express a willingness to do the work for the rations. The doctor says he will be enabled to leave the service and expects to be back in Eagle Lake and resume his practice here by the first of August. His many friends here hope for his speedy return.

MACK BROWN AND JESSE SPENCER TAKEN TO JAIL

Two Eagle Lake Negroes 'Arrested on Charge of Selling Whiskey Here on Sunday; Taken to Jail.

Constable Callison took into custody Monday Mack Brown and Jesse Spencer, known as "Big Boy," two negroes well known about town, on a charge of bootlegging, or selling whiskey on Sunday. The offense is said to have been committed on Sunday a week ago. In speaking of the arrest, Mr. Callison said that Spencer approached Mr. Chas. Harter, proprietor of the Crystal Bar and asked him to let him (Spencer) sell whiskey for him on Sunday. In amusements Mr. Harter asked the negro what he meant by wanting to sell whiskey on Sunday, when the negro explained that other negroes sold whiskey here on Sunday. At this statement Mr. Harter, so Mr. Callison stated, advanced the negro twenty-five cents and asked him to go see if he could buy a bottle of whiskey and then come back to him and he would tell him more about it. After a while the negro returned with a flask of whiskey and stated that he bought it from Mack Brown. Both negroes were arrested by Mr. Callison and taken to jail in Galveston.

TWO SUSPECTS HELD IN PULLMAN ROBBERY CASE

City Marshal Vineyard Holding Two Negroes For Investigation of Petty Theft From Pullman Cars.

City Marshal H. S. Vineyard on Monday night arrested two negro men, giving their names as Willie Broadwell and George Foster. Some days ago Mr. Vineyard received a letter from the railroad officials that articles of wearing apparel, hats and other things were being missed from the Pullman cars, while en route through this territory. Mr. Vineyard since that time has been keeping a watch on the passing night trains, and on Monday night found the two negroes on the back end of the Pullman on the west bound San Antonio & Aransas Pass train. They claim that their home is in Fulshear. Whether the two negroes taken into custody have and connection with the other robberies from the Pullman cars is not known, but the city marshal is holding them pending a thorough investigation.
