CITY MARSHAL ARRESTS A TRAVELING MAN HERE

Authorities at Range Wire For His Arrest And C. L. Ricketts Taken Into Custody by City Marshal.

City Marshal H. S. Vineyard arrested C. L. Ricketts, a traveling man, here Wednesday morning on complaint from the authorities at Range. Ricketts' arrest came about in a rather peculiar manner. He was a guest at the Drummers' Home and had presented Mrs. Frick with a check drawn by the Texas Law Firm of Dallas and made in his favor for \$17.55, asking that same be cashed. Mrs. Frick sent the check to the one of the local banks to ask if it was all right, but the bank instructed her that it would be risky business to cash the check without an endorsement. In just a few minutes later City Marshal Vineyard appeared at

the bank, and after talking with the cashier, he received orders for his arrest. The bankers were of the opinion that the name was the same that was on the check which had been presented to them just a few minutes before and so informed the city marshal, and a short while afterwards Mr. Vineyard found the man on the streets and placed him under arrest. The authority under which the city marshal acted was a telegram from Deputy Sheriff O. B. Haynes of Range, and was as follows:

"Arrest one C. L. Ricketts. I hold warrant for swindle. Will send warrant on first train."
