CANNING PLANT BEGINS OPERATIONS ON MONDAY

Eagle Lake Fruit and Canning Company

Will Begin Preserving Eggs Next Monday Morning.

The Eagle Lake Fruit and Canning Company, Messrs. Kolberg & Anderson, expect to begin operations at their preserving plant on Monday of the coming week. The big crop is fine this season and with a good rain in a few days they will have a large crop to draw from. Unlike last season, they will not be concerned for shipment to large concerns this year, but will preserve all fruit here. This firm has made quite a reputation in the past for its excellent quality of fig preserves, and every package of these preserves sent out of Eagle Lake bearing the label of the Eagle Lake company is a big boost for our section of the country. They expect to preserve from two to five thousand pounds of figs per day as soon as they get well under way with the work, having lately added two large copper pans to their preserving plant to enable them to carry on the work on a larger scale and to a better advantage. Every person who has ever eaten any of the preserves put up by this concern speaks of the quality only in the highest terms.

COLORADO COUNTY WENT AGAINST SUBMISSION IN 1910 BY 527, AND VOTED AGAINST PROHIBITION BY 1188.

Inasmuch as the question of Submission appears on the ticket to be voted on in the primary election tomorrow, some interest has been shown in the way Colorado county voted on the question in 1910. The Headlight's files show that the vote for Submission was 527, against Submission 1188. At the same election the candidates for governor, county Colquitt 805, Johnson 161 Davidson 239, Poindeexter 93. In the prohibition election that followed, Colorado county, according to the Headlight's files, voted for prohibition 500, against prohibition 1850, giving a majority against the amendment of 1188. It will be noted that the total vote on the submission question in this county in 1910 was 1280, and on the prohibition question 2350, or in numbers 1287 more votes cast in the prohibition election than in the election when the question of submission was voted on, which shows that the prohibition question lacked just 52 votes of having twice as many votes cast in that election as were voted in the submission question. This is due to the fact that the submission question was at the foot of the long ballot and was overlooked by many people and to the further fact that the question was voted on in the democratic primaries in which the republicans do not participate.
