WIFE BEATING CASE

IN LACACA COUNTY

The Hallettsville New Era re-

ports a case of wife beating at

Hallettsville, and the arrest of the

beater, a Bohemian, Tom Paval-

isko, by name and comments as

follows:

"If the New Era is not pre-

sumptuous we would suggest to

Judge Green that the mere fining

of wife beaters does not make the

punishment fit the crime. After

the woman gets the beating she

has to pay the fine, either by

drawing upon her slender finan-

cial resources or by extra labor

in the fields or by depriving her

children of necessary clothes,

school books and other requisites.

If the County Judge would im-

pose the heaviest jail sentence

possible on these semi-savages

there would be a lot less women

whipping in Lacaca county. We

have always felt that the quality

of the law is the quality of the

penalty.

with wrong doers and that the

penalty for crimes should be

made as light as possible, believ-

ing that the resulting remorse

carries with it its own pain, but

wife beaters are of a different

type to the average law breaker,

and now that the whipping post

has been abolished, confinement

in the county jail for some months

would seem to be the most salu-

tary punishment for the criminal

while the wife would receive a

long needed rest from his blows.

We believe that Judge Green will

agree with the New Era's views

and will render decisions in wife

beating cases in the future along

the lines indicated above."

STATE CONSTITUTION, AMEND-

ING SECTION 24, ARTICLE 3, OF

SONALITY

(S. J. R. No. 12)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION.

To amend Section 1, of Article 3, of

the Constitution of the State of Texas,

so as to give to the people, or to

them, the power to propose laws and

to enact or reject same at the polls, and

to approve or reject at the polls any Act

of the Legislature.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the

State of Texas:

That Section 1, of Article 3, of the

Constitution of the State of Texas, be

amended to read:

"Section 1. The Legislature of the

State of Texas shall have the power to

propose laws and to enact or reject

same at the polls, and to approve or
