

Made Junk Yard of His Stomach.

Norman, Okla., June 30.—Some three years ago a negro named Malachi Martin was sent to the Oklahoma insane asylum here from Leflore county. From the time he was committed his physical condition puzzled the physicians, as they could not determine what was the matter with him, and they agreed that when he died a post mortem should be held. He was 35 years of age and after gradually growing worse, died last night.

The post mortem was conducted by Dr. Day and Dr. Stoen of the sanitarium, and these articles were found in his stomach:

Four 20 penny nails, ten 16 penny nails, three 10 penny nails, fifteen 8 penny nails, one 6 penny nail, six 3 penny or shingle nails, one long screw, six tobacco tags, twelve 1-inch washers, fifty buttons of all kinds, twenty small pieces of tin and iron, one bed spring about three inches long with hook on each end, one small rubber comb, one tin of tacks, the iron of which had been covered with a wood handle, one larger half of a teaspoon handle, thirty pieces of glass ranging from a fraction of an inch to two inches in length and one inch in width, twelve brass toilet pieces, nine large safety pins, four tongues of safety pins from which evidently the fasteners and backs had corroded off in the stomach, trousers belt and hose buckles, eleven small washers, seven wire rings, two pennies of the dates 1901 and 1902, one door key, two alarm clock cog wheels, one shoe spring, one pegging awl wrench.

In all there were 236 pieces taken from the stomach, weighing one pound and nine ounces. One of the nails was five and one eighth inches long, and a number of them more than four inches.

The exhibit is being assembled, and a photograph will be taken for a medical journal.

During all the time Martin has been in the asylum, none of the attendants knew of his swallowing any such articles.
