Mr. O. G. Kolberg, farm demonstration agent for Colorado county, has handed the Headlight the following for publication:

RETURNED TO COLUMBUS AFTER 19 YEARS ABSENCE

After Living Nineteen Years in Mexico, L. B. Leyendecker Returns to Columbus

Columbus, Texas, May 31.—J. B. Leyendecker, who for the past 19 years has been engaged in the mining business on the Pacific slope in Mexico, returned to his former home in Columbus yesterday. Mr. Leyendecker was third lieutenant in company H, seventeenth Texas infantry, Confederate States army, and made a gallant soldier. He was captured before the close of the war and at the time of receiving his parole was a prisoner on Johnsons Island in Lake Erie. From 1863 to 1869 he was sheriff of Colorado county, being ousted under carpetbag rule, but owing to the inability of his would-be successor to give bond, he held the office several years longer than would otherwise have been the case.

For three months previous to his return to Texas he had been in the city of Mexico under the advice of his physician in an effort to regain his health, which had become impaired by long continued residence in the high altitudes of the mining regions. Failing to obtain the results wished for, he was advised to go down to Vera Cruz for a while. He remained in Vera Cruz about one week and here heard of the Tampico incident, which was about to cause war between the United

States and Mexico. SEVENTY-FIVE CARS OF SPUDS LEAVE HERE DAILY

Potato Harvest in Full Swing and About Seventy-Five Cars Are Being Shipped Out Daily

Potato harvest throughout this district is in full blast this week. Many of the fields are producing heavy yields and the quality of the spuds is exceptionally good. This price this week has remained around seventy and seventy-five cents. There are going out from this territory now on an average of about seventy five cars of potatoes every day. Labor is still very scarce and every hand available is being given work in the fields. Should the weather continue favorable to potato harvest, the planters, for the most part, will practically clean up in another ten days, although there will still be some digging done later than that. Many of the fields have produced yields of a hundred, hundred and twenty-five to two hundred bushels to the acre. The potatoes, unlike last week, are coming out pretty and clean. The color is fine and there is some scab, but not sufficient to have any effect on the price. Many of the potatoes this season are worm cut. This is due to the wet weather in which the grub worm thrived, and their signs are noticeable on many of the potatoes. Quite a lot of cotton is being planted this week, many of the farmers following with the planter right behind the diggers. The ground is in good shape, and they are hopeful of making a good cotton crop, even if the planting season is a little late.
