VASSAR FUDGE—Two cupsful of brown sugar, four ounces of chocolate (1 of a cupful) one tea-

spoonful of vanilla and a table- spoonful of butter. Boil till it threads from the spoon and beat till it creams. Broken nut meats can be added and shine shredded cocoanut stirred in just as it is removed from the fire makes a delicious variation.

BARNARD CARAMELS—Two cupsfuls of brown sugar, one of molasses, one cup of grated chocolate, one cup of boiled milk, one table- spoonful of flour, butter the size of a walnut. Let it boil slowly till it forms in water and pour on a flat tin to cool.

ANGEL ESSIENS LA RADCLIFFE—Two cupsful of dark brown sug- ar, three-fourths of a cup of half milk and half cream, and a table- spoonful of butter. Boil till it strings.
