RAY CITY EDITOR GROWS \$100 GRAPE FRUIT TREE

Ray City, Texas, December 14.—A true home of grapes, Smith, in this city, is a 25-year-old grape fruit tree that is worth for the buds alone \$100. The fact is that the owner has been offered that for the buds, or the privilege of taking buds from the tree for grafting purposes.

The tree was set out last fall at one year of age. This is the first year it has produced fruit, two clusters three in each cluster, the result of six blooms, an average of the fruit 9 inches in circumference.

In the other cluster the three measured 17 inches each. Another fruit, now green, set in July.
