Now, if each negro farmer would work not more than four or five acres to each member of his family (who is able to work) and diversify said acreage as follows: say a family of five, which would allow twenty-five acres; plant as follows: corn, ten acres; Irish potatoes, five acres; sweet potatoes, two acres; garden, two acres; and two acres cotton to only keep seed, so as to be ready whenever the time is ripe to plant more. I don't see any good in telling a man what he should do, without giving him something to do it with.
