This business grew and expanded, he later adding a stock of groceries and conducting a general grocery and bakery business. Later he entered into partnership in this business with Mr. W. A. Dallas, later purchasing the interest of his partner and

continued the business alone. Then the Farmers' Supply Company was organized and bought out the Mooney business.
